China. General Garibalds left Nice on the 21st inst. for Genoa. Before his departure he addressed the inhabitants of Nice, and said,-"I shall be ready to resume my command when necessary. Let us be united under Victor Emmanuel ; let us continue under arms as long as an inch of Italian soil remains oppressed." A letter from Nice of the 19th says :- "General Garibardi has arrived here, to the great astenishment of everybody. Not a soul knew anything of his coming, with the exception of Colonel Deiders, his host, who received a telegraphic despatch the evening before to apprise him of it. The picclamation addressed by the General to the Italians will excite great interest, as it throws light on what is passing in Central Italy, and scems to explain the real state of affairs. Garibaldi left Bologna some days ago, passed through Turin, only staying just long enough to see the King, and got here at the same time as the Turin journals which announced his arrival in the capital. I have seen the General; he is in excellent health, notwithstanding all the fatigue which he has undergone. He is not generally very communicative, and now he is less so than usual, but his every word betrays a profound irritation."

The Corriere Mercantile publishes the following proclemation, issued by General Garibaldi on his arrival at Genua :-

"TO MY COMPANIONS IN ARMS OF CENTRAL ITALY. "Let not my temporary absence cool your ardour for the holy cause that we defend.

"In separating myself from you whom I love as the representative of a sublime idea—the idea of Italian deliverance-I am excited and sad ; but consolation comes in the certainty that shall soon be among you again, to aid you in finishing the work so gloriously begun, For you, as for me, the greatest of all possi-

his misfortunes would be not to be present wherever there is fighting for Italy. Young men who have sworn to be faithful to Italy and to the chief who will lead you to victory, lay not down your arms; remain firm at your post, continue your exercises, persevere in the soldier's discipline. "The truce will not last long; old diplomacy

seems but little disposed to see things as they really are. Diplomacy still fooks upon you as the handful of ma contents which she has been accustomed to despise. She does not know that in you there are the elements of a great ration, and that in your free and independent hearts there germinate the seeds of a world wide revolution if our rights shall not be recognised, and if people will not allow us to be masters in our own home.

We desire to invade no foreign soil; let us remain unmol-sted on our cwn! Whospever attempts to gainsay this our determination will find that we will never be slaves, unless they succeed in crushing by force an entire people ready to die for liberty.

"But even should we all fall, we shall begreath to future generations a legacy of hatred and vengeance against foreign domination; the inheritunce of each of our sons will be a rifle and the consciousness of his rights; and, by the blessing of God, the oppressor will never sleep coundly.

"Italians, I say again do not lay down your arms; rally more closely than ever to your chiefs, and maintain the strictest discipline. Fellow citizens, let not a man in Italy omit to contribute his wite to the national subscription; let not one fail to clean his gun, so as to be readyperhaps to morrow-to obtain by force that which to day they hesitate to grant to our just
