A PROCLAMATION .- BY THE QUEEN. VICTORIA R.

Whereas We are happily at Peace with all Sovereigns, Powers, and States: And whereas, notwithstanding Our utmost Exertions to preserve Peace between all the Sovereign Powers and States now at War, Hostilities have unhapply commenced between His Imperial Majesty The Emperor of Austria on the one Part, and His Majesty The King of Sar-dinia and His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of the French on the other Part :

And whereas a State of War now exists be tween His Imperial Majesty The Emperor of Austria on the one Part, and His Majesty The King of Sardinia and His Imperial Majesty The Emperor of the French on the other Part, and between their respective Subjects and others in-habiting within their Countries, Territories, or Dominions:

And whereas We are on Terms of Friendship and amicable Intercourse with all and each o these Sovereigns, and with their several Subjects and others inhabiting within their Countries, Territories, or Dominious:

And whereas great numbers of Our loyal Subjects reside and carry on Commerce, and possess Property and Establishments, and enjoy various Rights and Privileges, within the Dominions of each of the aforesaid Sovereigns, protected by the Faith of Treaties between Us and each

of the aforesaid Sovereigns:

And whereas We being desirous of preserving to Our Subjects the Blessings of Peace, which they now happily enjoy, are firmly purposed and determined to abstain altogether from taking any Part, directly or indirectly, in the War now un happily existing between the said Sovereigns their Subjects and Territories, and to remain at Peace with and to maintain a peaceful and friendly Intercourse with all and with each of them, and their respective Subjects, and others inhabit-ing within any of their Countries, Territories, and Dominions, and to maintain a strict and impartial Neutrality in the said Hostilities and war unhappily existing between them:

We, therefore, have thought fit, by and with the Aid of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal

And We do hereby strictly charge and command all Our loving Subjects to govern them-selves accordingly, and to observe a strict Neu-trality in and during the aforesaid Hostilities and War, and to abstain from violating or contraven-ing either the Laws and Statutes of the Realm in this Behalf, or the Law of Nations in relation thereto, as they will answer to the contrary at

And whereas in and by a certain Statute made and passed in the Fifty-ninth Year of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to prevent the enlisting or Engagement of His "Majesty's Subjects to serve in a Foreign "Service, and the fitting out or equipping, in "His Majesty's Dominions, Vessels for Warlike "Purposes, without His Majesty's Licence," it is amongst other Things declared and enacted as

"That if any Person within any Part of the United Kingdom, or in any Part of His Majesty's Dominions beyond the Seas, shall, without the leave and License of His Majesty for that purpose first had and obtained as aforesaid, equip furnish, fit out, or arm, or procure to be equipequipping, furnishing, fitting out, or arming of any ship or vessel or shall be employed in the service of any Foreign Prince, State, or Potentate, vice of any Foreign Prince, State, or Potentate, or of any Foreign Colony, Province, or Part of any Province or People, or of any Person or Persons exercising or assuming to exercise any powers of Government in or over any Foreign State, Colony, Province, or Part of any Province or People, as a Transport or Store Ship, or with intent to cruise or commit Hostilities against any Prince, State, or Potentate, or against the Subjects or Citizens of any Prince, State, or Potentate, or against the Persons exercising or assuming to exercise the Powers of Government in any Colony. Province, or Part of any Province or ing to exercise the Powers of Government in any Colony, Province, or Part of any Province or country, or against the Inhabitants of any Foreigh Colony, Province, or Part of any Province or Gountry, with whom His Majesty shall not then be at war, or shall within the United Kingdom or any of His Majesty's Dominions, or in any Settlement, Colony, Territory, Island, or place belonging or subject to His Majesty, issue or deliver any Commission for any Ship or Vessel, to the intent that such Ship or Vessel shall be employed as aforesaid, every such Person so be employed as aforesaid, every such Person so offending shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall upon Conviction thereof upon any Information or Idictment, be punished by Fine and Imprisonment, or either of them, at the discretion of the Court in which such offender shall be convicted; and every such Ship or Vessel, with the Tackle, Apparel, and Furniture, together with all the Materials, Arms, Ammunition, and Stores which may belong to or be on board of any such Ship or Vessel, shall be forfeit; and it shall be lawful for any Officer of His Majesty's Customs or Excise, or any Officer of His Majesty's Navy, who is by Law empowered to make Seizures for any Forfeiure incurred under any of the Laws of Customs or Excise, or the Laws of the Laws of Customs of Excise, of the Laws of Trade and Navigation, to seize such Ships and Vessels aforesaid, and in such places and in such manner in which the Officers of His Majesty's Customs or Excise and the Officers of His Majesty's Navy are empowered respectively to make Seizures under the Laws of Customs and Excise, or under the Laws of Customs and Excise, or under the Laws of Trade and Navigation; and that every such Ship and Vessel, with the Tackle, Apparel, and Furniture, together with all the Materials, Arms, Ammunition, and Stores which may belong to or be on board of such Ship or Vessel, may be prosecuted and condemned in the like manner and in such and condemned in the like manner and in such Courts as Ships or Vessels may be prosecuted and condemned for any Breach of the Laws made for the Protection of the Revenues of Customs and Excise, or of the Laws of Trade and Navi-

And it is in and by the said Act further en

"That if any person in any part of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or in any Part of His Majesty's Dominions beyond the Seas without the Leave and Licence of His Ma-Seas without the Leave and Licence of His Majesty for that Purpose first had and obtained as aforesaid, shall, by adding to the Number of the Guns of such Vessel, or by changing those on board for other Guns, or by the Addition of any Equipment for War, increase or argument, or procure to be increased or argumented, or shall be knowingly concerned in increasing or augmenting the Warlike Force of any Ship or Vessel. be knowingly concerned in increasing or augmenting, the Warlike Force of any Ship or Vessel of War or Cruiser, or other armed Vessel, which at the Time of her Arrival in any Part of the United Kingdom or any of His Majesty's Dominions was a Ship of War, Cruizer, or armed Vessel in the Service of any Foreign Prince State, or Potentate, or of any Person or Persons exercising or assuming to exercise an Powers of Government in or over any Colony, Province, or Part of any Province or People belonging to the Subjects of any such Prince, State, or Potentate, or to the Inhabitants of any Colony, Province, or Part of any Province or Country under the Control of any Porson or Persons so exercising or assuming to exercise the Powers of Government, every such Person so offending shall be deemed guilty of a Misslemeanor, and shall, upon being convicted thereof upon any Information or Indictment, be punishat the Discretion of the Court before which such Offender shall be convicted.'

Now, in order that none of Our Subjects may unwarily render themselves hable to the Penalties imposed by the said Statute, we do hereby the public, that a Committee will be in attenwhatsoever do commit any Act, Matter, or Thing whatsoever contrary to the Provisions of the nursuse of looking after and directing attention. the said Statute, upon Pain of the several Penalties by the said Statue imposed, and of Our

high Displeasure.

And We do hereby warn and admonish all our loving Subjects, and all Persons whatsoever entitled to Our Pr tection, to observe towards each titled to Our Pr tection, to observe towards each and all of the aforesaid Save cigns, their Subjects and Territories, and towards all Belligerents whatsoever with whom we are at Peace, the Duties of Neutrality; and to respect, in all and each of them, the exercise of those Belligerent Rights which We, and Our Royal Predecessors, have always claimed to exercise.

And we do hereby farther warn all Our loving Subjects, and all Persons whatsoever entitled to Our Protection, that if any of them shall presume, in contempt of this Our Royal proclamation and of Our High Displeasure, to do any Acts in derogation of their Duty as Subjects of a Neutral Sovereign, in a War between other Sovereigns, or in violation or contravention of the Law of Nations in the Behalf, as more especially by breaking, or endeavouring to break, any Blockade lawfully and actually established by or on behalf of any or either of the said Sovereigns, by carrying Officers, Soldiers, Des patches, Arms Ammunition, Military Stores or Materials, or any Article or Articles considered and deemed to be contraband of War, according to the Law or modern Usages of Nations, for the Use or service of any or either of the Sovereigns that all Persons so offending, together with their Ships and Goods, will rightfully incur and be justly liable to hostile Capture, and to the Penal-ties denounced by the Law of Nations in that

And We do hereby give notice, that all Our Subjects and Persons entitled to Our Protection who may misconduct themselves in the Premises will do so at their Peril, and of their own wrong and that they will in nowise obtain any Protection from Us against such Capture or such Penalties as aforesaid, but will, on the contrary incur our high Displeasures by such Misconduct. EDUCATED FARMERS.

It is time for those who do not believe ignor ance to be a blessing, to more in behalf of common schools. Many teachers are not practised even in the rudiments of the spelling-book; and as for reading, they stumble along the sentences, like a drunken man on a rough road. Their "hand-write," as they felicitously style the hieroglyphics, would be a match for Champoliion, even if he did decipher the Egyptian inscriptions. But a more detestable fact is, that sometimes their morals are bad; they are intemperate, coarse, and ill-tempered; and wholly unfit to inspire the minds of the pupils with one generous or pure sentiment. We do not mean to characterize the body of the common schoolmasters by these remarks; but that any considerable portion of them should be such, is a disgraceful evidence of the low state of edu-

which comes home to you. Crafty politicians third daughter of Mr. Cornelius McN. ntly calling you the bone and sinew of of the Parish of Waterborough. the land; and you may depend upon it that you will never be anything else but bone and sinew without education. There is a law of God in this matter. That class of men who make the most and best use of their heads, will, in fact be the most influential, will stand highest, whatever the theories and speeches may say. This is a "nature of things" which cannot be dodged, nor got over. Whatever class bestow great pains upon the cultivation of their minds will stand high. It farmers and mechanics feel them-selves to be as good as other people, it all may be true; for goodness is one thing and intelligence is another. If they think that they have just as much mind as other classes, that may be true; but can you use it as well?

Lawyers, and physicians, and clergymen, and literary men, make the discipline of their intellect a constant study. They read more, think more, write more than the laboring classes. The difference between the educated and uneducated ed portions of society is a real difference. Now a proud and lazy fellow, may rail and swear at Frindesburg, Humphreys, Halifax, Kirk & Worthis, and have his labor for his pains. There is ral, bal. only one way really to get over it, and that is to Thursday-Brigt. Bloomer, Bulwer, New York, rear up a generation of well educated, thinking, Smith Brothers, flour and cement. reading farmers and mechanics. Your skill and Mariner, Atkinson, New York, J. & T. Robinindustry are felt; and they put you, in these respects, ahead of any other class. Just as soon as pects, ahead of any other class. Just as soon as Friday—Ship Morning Star, Foster, Boston, bal. your heads are felt, as much as your hands are, Steamer Admiral, McLaren, Boston, passengers that will being you to the terms. hat will bring you to the top.

Many of our best farmers are men of great natural shrewdness; but when they were young they "had no chance for learning." They feel Brig Bowes, Hansley, Bridgeport, S. Wiggins the loss, and they are giving their children the best education they can. Farmers' sons constitute three-fifths of the educated class. But the thing is, that they are not educated as farmers. When they begin to study they leave the farm. They do not expect to return to it. The idea of sending a boy to the school, the academy, and the college, and then let him go back to the farming, is regarded as a mere waste of time and selves. If a boy has an education, you expect him to be a lawyer, or a doctor, or a preacher. You tacitly admit that a farmer does not need such an education; and if you think so, you cannot blame others if they follow your example.

There is no reason why men of the very highest education should not go to a farm for their living. If a son of mirror are the server of the server is the server

living. If a son of mine were brought up on purpose to be a farmer, if that was the calling he preferred, I still would educate him, if he had common sense to begin with. He would be as much better for it as a farmer, as he would as a lawye. There is no reason why a thoroughly scientific education should not be given to every farmer and to every mechanic. A beginning must be made at the common school. Every must be made at the common school. Every neighborhood ought to have one. But they do not grow of themselves, like toad-stools. And no decent man will teach school on wages which a canal boy, or a hostler would turn up his nose at. You may as well put your money into the fire as to send it to a "make-believe" teacher—a great noodle—head, who teaches school because he is fit for nothing else! Lay out to get a good teacher. Re willing to pay enough to make it teacher. Be willing to pay enough to make it worth while for "smart" men to become your teachers. And when your boys show an awakening taste for books, see that they have good histories, travels, and scientific tracts and treatises. Above all, do not let a boy get a notion that if he is educated, he must, of course, quit the farm. Let him get an education that he may make a better farmer. I do not despair of yet seeing a generation of honest politicians. Educated farmers and educated mechanics, who are in good circumstances, and do not need office for a support, nor make politics a trade, will stand the best chance for honesty. But the Lord deliver us from the political honesty of tenth-rate lawyers, vagabond doctors, brawling preachers, and bankrupt clerks, turned into patrio ic politicians!—Beecher. 
