Stanley is famous for its breed of sheep,—a cross between the Leicester and Coltswold-and this year it fully sustained its reputation. The Pigs crosses between the Suffolk and Berkshire, and the Essex and Berkshire-were much admired. The display of vegetables, cereals, and articles of domestic manufacture, gave the judges much satisfaction. The samples of pointoes—Early Blues. and Plack and Pink Christies-were particularly good, as also those of the Turnips-Swedish and Purple Topped Hybrid.

All the samples of Grain were very fine. There was one of white Oats shown, which weighed 514 lbs. to the bushel, which is almost unprecedented. The Black Oats were nearly as heavy. The Mitts, Hose, and Homespun, were pronounced to be very superior."-Courier.
