sociated Press. The movements of the Austrians in Italy are totally inexplicable; greas indecision is exhibited. They keep occupying places and then abandoning them almost immediately after occupation. Heavy rains had occurred in Italy, this it was thought might account, in part, for the strange movements of the Austrians.

A Vienna official bulletin explains, that the Austrians had taken up a position between the Po and the Sezia rivers to await better weather before resuming the offensive.

The Emperor of France and Prince Napoleon, left Paris on the 10th for Genoa, where a great reception awaited them from the Sardinians,-The Empress has been proclaimed Regent of

France during the Emperor's absence.

BRITAIN.—The English Parlimentary elections are almost over. The ministerial gain is variously estimated at from 19 to 28.

Count DePresigny has been appointed French Minister at London, and will enter upon his duties immediately; the late Ambassador, the Duke of Malakoff, having been recalled, probably to give the Emperor the benefit of his counsul in the great military struggle fast approaching Paris, May 11 .- The Boarse to-day is flat,

rather lower, threes 68. LATEST .- A Turin telegram says that the Austrians are recrossing the river Sezia in haste. The Sardinian Commander-in-Chief General Della Marmora, of Crimean notoriety, has made the River Dork his strategetical line.

The Austrians have declared Ancona in a state of siege, but the Pope protested, and Austria has promised to reconsider her decision. The French army at Rome is to be increased considerably, and placed on a war footing.

LIVERPOOL MARKETS .- Flour very dull, with a downward tendency; some authorities quote a decline; wheat had materially declined, and corn was also considerably lower. The provision market was quiet and nominal. Consols Wednesday noon 91 g to 91 g.

RISING IN TURKEY .- The Vienna correspondent of the Times says- The attention of the British public is at this moment so exclusively directed to Italy, that it would be vain to say much about Turkish matters, but you must permit me to observe en passant that we are on the eve of a general rising in European Turkey. The Porte has about 120,000 men concentrated at Shumla, Sophia, &c., and Omar Pacha is coming on the wings of the wind from Bagdad to the Turkish capital, but the Russo-French plan for the dismemberment of Turkey is a good one, and in all human probability the days of the Mussulmans in Europe are numbered. I am unable at present to give you any positive information on the subject, but there is reason to believe that the Oriental question will be before the public again before the world is two months older. Movements have recently been observed in Montenegro which have induced the Anstrians to strengthen the defences of Cattaro on the land side. Prince Milosch is raising the Servian militia, and in a short time he is likely to have between 30,000 and 40,000 fighting men under his command. Prince Couza has demanded back the arms which the Russians carried off with them when they quitted-the Danubian Principalities at the beginning of the last war, and the chances are that they will be returned, the French Government having declared that the request of the Hospodar is a reasonable one. Bulgaria is, comparatively speaking, quiet, but the political agitation in the southern provinces of Turkey in Europe—Albania, Macadonia Thessaly, and Thrace—is exceedingly great. In Greece itself the patriots openly declare that the moment for enlarging the kingdom has arrived. Of the state of things in the south Sclavenic provinces of Austria nothing favour-able can be said, it being a positive fact that the Russian propagandists were never so active there as they are at present. Hungary is also full of Russian agents, and it has recently been remarked that the Czechs -in Bohemia-display more animosity than usual towards the Germans.

THE NEW FRENCH GUNS .- There are ugly reports affoat of some mishap having befallen the new French guns-constructed after the Imperial ideas. This sometimes takes the form of news that a large number of these guns-one informant said between 200 and 300-had burst in trials; sometimes, that some part of their breech-loading machinery has suffered in the course of the rough usage they have experienced during the first stages of their mountain transit, so that the greater part of the guns are, for the time being, useless. I am not aware what is the authority for these rumours; but I mention them, as I have heard them from very different sources - Correspondent of the Manchester Guardian.
