ONE DAY LATER FROM EUROPE.

Arrival of the City of Washington. New York, Aug. 30. Steamer City of Washington, from Liverpool via Queenstown 18th, arrived at this port at an early hour this morning.

The following is the latest telegraphic intelligence by the City of Washington: LONDON, Thursday, Aug. 18. The Daily News City Article of Wednesday evening says: the funds opened with a little dullness in consequence of the fall yesterday on the Paris Bourse. The final quotations of consols were only about 1-8 below those of yesterday. The chief support is derived from the scarcity of stock. The stock exchange was languid.

With the completion of the fortnightly settlement, members have left London and others are following their example. The demand for money to-day was slack, and the best bills were speedily taken at 2 1/2. A sum of £400,000 in gold was sent into the Bank to-day. The £118,000 by the Southampton, from Melbourne, was purchased for transmission abroad. The remittances of silver for Calcutta and China, by the steamer of the 5th ult., will probably amount to £500,000 and £600,000.

The Produce market was very dull, and as regards articles, prices show a drooping tendency. The corn market to-day was steady at full prices. The Times' City article of last evening says: A reaction of 1/2 in consols at the opening was not recovered during the day. There was scarcely any general business, but the government broker took £100,000 stock on account of the Savings Bank. At the Bank to-day applications have been very few. There has been no new feature in the Railway market to-day. In some cases prices were slightly lower.

Napoleon's Amnesty. The Times says: For the first time the Emperor feels himself strong in the affections of his army, and so sure in the loyalty of his people that he can afford to be magnanimous. The early use to which he puts the power he has acquired by his successful campaign, is to publish among all nations a full and entire amnesty to all Frenchmen.

The Daily News says that orders are to be transmitted to Cayenne, and to many other unknown dependencies of political victims, to let as many as survive go free.

M. Louis Blanc has addressed a letter to the Daily News, in which he admits that Louis Napoleon could scarcely do more for the political exiles than he has done; but asks: Why should the exiles return to France? He then replies: Better stay in the land of unfettered thought and freedom—better live where an exile is to remain a man.

The Minister of the Interior, in connection with his colleague, the Minister for Foreign Affairs, has ordered the necessary arrangements to be made to insure the execution of the full and entire amnesty granted by the Emperor.

Their Imperial Majesties left yesterday for St. Cloud, where they will sojourn till September, when they will proceed to Biarritz.

Nine hundred and twenty-two soldiers sentenced for various offences, have either been pardoned or the terms of their imprisonment commuted.

PARIS, Wednesday, Aug. 17. The young Grand Duke of Tuscany arrived yesterday at Paris. He has been received by the Emperor, who invited him to remain to wait what events may transpire. The Emperor gave him a very gracious reception.

TURIN, Aug. 17. The King arrived here this evening, and was welcomed with great cheers by a large crowd assembled at the station. The National Guard and Piedmontese troops were drawn up in line during the passage of His Majesty.

Gen. Guillon has sent in his resignation, which has been accepted. A collision has taken place on the Railway line to Genoa, and six persons killed.
