

SUGAR COOKIES .- One cup of sugar, one cup f butter, one egg, a little nutmeg, and flour enough to roll thin. Bake quick.

LEMON CUSTARD PIE .- Grate the rind of a lemon, and after squeezing it until you have all the juice, wash the pulp in a tescap of claar water; then add the water to the juice with the grated rind, and one teacup of sugar ; put over the fire, add let boil hard. When a little cool, add one egg well beaten, and a tablespoontul of flour, or rolled crackers. Bake with an under crust. One lemon makes one good pie. FRENCH ROLLS .- A quart of milk, a coffee

cup of butter, two eggs. Let the dough rise twice in the dish, and after rolling it out. let it stand in the pans half an hour before baking.
