On Mr. Gray's Bill for enabling parties having claims against the province to have the same adjudicated upon in courts of law, the Committee rose and reported progress in order that the Hon, member might have time to make the necessary amendments. The principle of the Bill was agreed to by most of the speakers.

Mr. Wilmot charges the Attorney General with falsehood, and cries of "chair, chair," "order, order," resounded throughout the Senate Chamber. He thus particularises, 'The gates are swung wide open, partly off their hinges, and the snow and ice have gathered about them. and frozen them back, so that there is not a possibility of moving them.
