RAILWAY TRAVELLING.

The number of persons who travelled over the line between St. John and Sussex on Thursday, is thought to have been upwards of 2,500. The morning train from Sussex, brought in a tremendous crowd, and St. John sent out about the same number to supply the places left vacant by the Sussexers.
