NOVA SCOTIA. We learn by the Nova Scotia papers that great excitement prevails throughout the Province with regard to the general election which is soon to come off.

VERY LATE AN EARTHQUAKE. An extraordinary disturbance of the elements was observed by many persons in this city, on the morning of Wednesday, which is believed to have been a genuine earthquake.

Mr. Howe moved a Resolution the other day for the encouragement of Steam Navigation in our Eastern waters by giving £500 to a Steamer to be run between Pictou, Port Hood, Arichat, &c.—and also an additional £75 to the Steamer plying on the Bras d'Or Lake.

Mr. Young's Bill to establish the decimal system of accounting has passed the Nova Scotia House of Assembly.

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We observe that the Prohibitory Bill has passed the Council. The Journal says—The public were rather astonished to find that notwithstanding the adverse Report of the Committee of the Council, that Body has passed the Prohibitory Liquor Bill, after some discussion.

The Liquor Law has produced a good many Legislative jokes, if it has done nothing else.—Some discussion as to the etymology of the word "cider" having arisen, Mr. Wilkins suggested that it was derived from the Latin word "sidera"—stars—because its exhilarating properties make a man's eyes twinkle.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

The Steamship Canada, Capt. Lang, which sailed from Liverpool on the 26th ult., arrived at Halifax at 10 o'clock on Friday morning.

THE PROPOSED CONGRESS.—A despatch from Vienna states that Austria on the 23rd agreed to the proposed Congress, and that it would probably meet at Aix-la-Chapelle. All the other powers had previously given their consent.

Paris letters in the Nord states that the Sardinian cabinet has addressed a communication to the five Great Powers, strongly insisting on being allowed to take part in the deliberations on the affairs of Italy, and the Paris correspondent of the London Post says that in consequence of the representations by Cavour, the French Government consented that Piedmont and the other Italian states shall be represented at the Conference.

It is stated that Austria consented to the Congress, under certain conditions, but they are not of much importance. It is supposed that she would as a matter of course insist on the strict maintenance of the Treaties of 1815 but that she will hardly object to a revision of her special Treaties with the Italian States.

The French Journals assume that Lord Cowley's mission to Vienna has had nothing to do with the Congress, and credit Russia with the proposition.

The London Star believes Lord Malmesbury has been appointed to represent England in the Congress.

GREAT BRITAIN.—Parliamentary proceedings on the 23rd unimportant.

On the 24th in the House of Commons, the debate was continued on the Reform question, being crowded to excess, while the excitement outside was undiminished. Speeches in opposition to the Government Bill were made by Messrs. Muner, Gibson, Bernal, Osborne, Walpole and Bright, while it was supported by Messrs. Carlyle, B. Hope and others. The debate was further adjourned.

In the Commons, Owen Stanley gave notice that in the event of the Reform Bill being rejected on the second reading, he should move a resolution that the measure of the Government having failed to give satisfaction, the Government were no longer entitled to confidence of the House.

The debate on the Reform Bill was resumed. Cardinal Palmerston spoke in favour of Russell's resolution. The latter entirely repudiated all fictitious motives and declared Russell's resolution not to be regarded as a vote of censure. Sir S. Northcote and Mr. Whiteside defended the government. The debate was further adjourned.

B'l in Committee. The Daily News says that it is a party-move, the interest in the debate is at an end.

The Star says, Palmerston, has completely turned the tables on Russell. It is reported in Paris that the Emperor of Austria made Lord Cowley a Knight of Grand Cross of the order of Leopold.

Count Cavour arrived at Paris on the 25th. It is stated that four hundred thousand muskets on the improved model are being made for the French Army.

The Bourne on the 23rd and 24th was firm and advanced to 69.20, but on 25th was flat and then declined to 68.90 for money and 60.80 for accounts.

A Toulon journal announces that four steam frigates had received orders to sail for the purpose of fetching troops from Algeria.

On the other hand 1000 soldiers sailed from Marseilles 22d to reinforce the army in Algeria.

A ministerial order to keep back those reinforcements reached Marseilles after they had sailed.

Count Sigismund Krasinski, a distinguished Polish exile, died at Paris.

PARIS, Saturday.—Monsieur this morning announced the appointment of Count Chesaloup Laubart, Minister of Algeria and Colonies, also that four regiments of line intended to form part of African army had received orders immediately to depart for Algeria.

SARDINIA.—A rumor had been current that Cavour had been succeeded as Premier by M. Aketria, but not confirmed.

On 21st a picket of Austrian cavalry crossed to the Piedmontese side of the Ticin, opposite Pavia, for the purpose of exploring the frontiers, and afterwards returned.

Tudia telegram of 21st says—Cavour would leave that evening for Paris, every thing continued tranquil there.

It is stated that twelve convents at Genoa had been cleared of inmates in order to allow premises to be employed for quartering troops in case of need.

It is vaguely reported that Sardinian Council had been recalled from Trieste.

GERMANY.—The Grand Duchy of Baden is making warlike preparations. With the exception of Bavaria, Wurtemberg, Hanover, Baden, and Electoral Hesse, the other States of German Confederation and particularly those of the North appear to have determined on waiting for impulse which may be given to them by Prussia before taking any military measures.

SWITZERLAND.—Federal council increased to 400 francs the export duty on horses leaving the Swiss Territory.

ITALY.—At anclave of Cardinals the Pope referred to the evacuation of his States by the foreign troops and decided he had said he felt himself sufficiently strong to dispense with extraneous assistance as a secular and warlike prince might have done.

His Holiness repeated it was only to avert conflict which might lead to general conflagration that induced him to demand the withdrawal of foreign garrisons.

Milan Gazette confirms the statement that M. Riformanti, Editor of a newspaper, had been assassinated in Pavia.

RUSSIA.—A St. Petersburg telegram of the 25th says the new three per cent. loan of twelve millions sterling has been concluded with the house of Thomson, Bonar & Co. at 67.

AUSUALIA.—The steamer Oneida, with the mails from Melbourne on Feb. 5th, and Sydney 2nd, arrived at Suez March 15th. She had seventy-six thousand pounds sterling in gold.

Sailing vessels had departed for England between Dec 24th and the end of January, bearing in aggregate nearly 258,000 ounces of gold.

At Melbourne the stocks of imports continued large. Wool is in active demand. Gold market dull. Exchange at sixty days sight at par.

At Sydney exchange was bought at one discount and sold at one half premium.
