The 23d regiment of the line had arrived at Marseilles from Algiers.

It was stated that horses were about to be purchased in Algeria and Tunis for the French cavalry.

The 22d of February was thought to be the day fixed for the meeting of the Conference to discuss the point raised by the double election of Col. Cowan as Hospodar of the Danubian Principalities.

AUSTRIA.—The Oesterreichische correspondent contains an official article in which it is admitted that the speech made by the Emperor Napoleon, at the opening of the Legislative Assembly, is calculated to dissipate the apprehensions of war, which have recently been entertained in Europe.

SARDINIA.—The Paris correspondent of the London Globe states as a settled affair that the King of Sardinia will marry Maria, daughter of the Grand Duchess Maria of Russia.

NAPLES.—The Neapolitan frigate Stromboli, with the armed political prisoners on board, was at Cadix on the 3d of February for the purpose of transferring the prisoners to a Spanish vessel bound to New York.

RUSSIA.—A rumor prevailed that Russia was concentrating troops on the frontiers of Moldavia and it was asserted that in the event of a war in Italy an army of 200,000 men will be posted in Russian Poland.

The entire Russian Mediterranean squadron was expected at Nice in the month of March.
