He took up this position as it might enable him to sid the wounded, and should any boats be sunk, to rescue their crews—in other words, to afford all the aid consistent with neutrality. Having been informed by a British officer that the Admiral was danger ously wounded. Capt. Tat nall went in a barge to visit him. When within a few feet of the Cormorant, a round shot struck the boat, killed the coxwain, Mr. Her, of Brooklyn, N. Y., and slightly wounded Flag-Lieuteuant Trenchard. They reached the Cormorant before the boat actually sank. Captain Tattnall says the Chinese had previously notified Mr. Ward of their arrangements, and requested him to accompany the British and French Ministers to the Pet ho. To this he consented, thereby to a certain extent assuming the same platform as the latter. The sincerity of the Commissioners was much doubted at the time.

The China Mail says that Admiral Hope and all three of the Maristers were informat that hey were to be received at the northern entrance or embankment, ant not at the mouth of the Peibo, where the attacks on the forts was made.
