DESTRUCTIVE FIRE IN HALIFAX, N. S., AND LOSS OF LIFE.

The Halifax Journal of the 31st ult. furnishes a graphic account of a fearful fire which recently occurred in that City. It says:—

"The destruction by fire of the Bigby buildings corner of Duke and Halls streets on Tuesday evening last, between the hours of 9 and 10 o'clock, which has already been fully reported by several of our contemporaries, is by far the most destructive conflagration, as far as loss of human life is concerned that has ever occurred in Halifax. This conflagration commenced in that part of the premises occupied by Mr. Jones Hagar, a hat manufacturer, in which he also resided. The fire began with an explosion, and one or two others followed in quick succession: The Fire Department and Military, including the Dockyard and Ordnance Engines, were speedily at the scene of disaster, but it was evident at a glance that no power on earth could by any possibility save the premises already on fire.

In less than five minutes the flames which persons employed in the building—women on their benches and clerks at their desks—were driven from their stations and only saved their lives by precipitate flight. Two of the young men employed in the Journal Office, and several others, who had entered Mr. Hagar's premises for the purpose of rendering assistance narrowly escaped suffocation and burning by losing their way and mistaking the rear for the front of the building. The flames completely enveloped the building in less than half a hour from the first inception of the conflagration; and all the exertions of the Fireman and Military were directed to the preservation of the surrounding buildings. How strenuous were their successful endeavors in this particular is proved by the charred fronts of the premises more immediately in danger.

But as previously stated, the loss of life by the recent fire is unprecedented in this city and consequently forms its most melancholy feature. The casualties which met their horrible death by this catastrophe are Mr. Jones Hagar and Mr. Joseph Grant, brother of Mr. Wm. Grant, senior, of this City. There can be little doubt that the late conflagration was occasioned by an accident to some combustibles used in his business.
