Austrian army crossed the Ticino on the 26th. and took a portion of the enemy's territory, and the main army crossed on the 29th. By all accounts the Austrians had determined on a vigorous movement, and there can be little doubt are desirous of striking a blow before the French troops can reach them.

War enthusiasm is increasing in France. Paris was in a state of high excitement. The French were unprepared for the sudden movement of the Austrians, they expected to begin war at their leisure, somewhere about the end of May.

The difficulties and delays on Mount Cenis will be considerable, and although the French are carried rapidly, they arrive there without means of entering on a campaign immediately.

The French Government had received intelligence of an outbreak in Algeria, which would probably require the return of the troops lately sent to Italy.

The Times says that nearly all naval engineers have their hands full of foreign orders.

Up to last night (29th) 142 members had been elected to the new Parliament, 112 without opposition.
