

Austrian army crossed the Ticino on the 26th, and took a portion of the enemy's territory, and the main army crossed on the 29th. By all accounts the Austrians had determined on a vigorous movement, and there can be little doubt as to the desirability of striking a blow before the French troops can reach them.

War enthusiasm is increasing in France. Paris was in a state of high excitement. The French were unprepared for the sudden movement of the Austrians, they expected to begin war at their leisure, somewhere about the end of May.

The difficulties and delays on Mount Cenis will be considerable, and although the French are carrying on a campaign immediately, the intelligence of an outbreak in Algeria, which would require the return of the troops lately sent to Italy.

The Times says that nearly all naval engineers have their hands full of foreign orders. Up to last night (29th) 142 members had been elected to the new Parliament, 112 without opposition.

WAR COMMENCED!
BOSTON, May 16, 1859.

MORE FIGHTING!—THE AUSTRIANS VICTORIOUS!—GREAT EXCITEMENT IN ENGLAND.

Steamer Arago, with English advices of the 4th inst, one day later, was intercepted off Newfoundland on Saturday last.

A Royal Proclamation issued offering £10 bounty to seamen, with the intention of recruiting 10,000 additional seamen.

Great activity prevailed in the Dock Yards, English preparing in case of war.

Telegrams from the seat of war state that in all probability there was a sharp action at the Bridge of Buffalora on the 28th ult. It is reported that the Austrians, after considerable loss, took it at the point of the bayonet.

Mortals are reported taken. The Sardinians retreated before the Austrians to Darligo Maggiore. The telegraph wires to Switzerland have been cut by the Austrians at Margu.

The Austrians were concentrating at Vicenza. Forty thousand French troops are in Genoa at present.

It was thought that the King of Sardinia accompanied by Generals Canrobert and Neill, had visited the line of the river Dork.

The Austrians had seized the Sardinian vessels on Lago Maggiore.

The French Emperor was expected to join the Army on the 4th May.

Austria wants a loan of twenty millions of pounds.

Prussia was putting an army in readiness to march. She sympathizes with the Austrians.

Napoleon's Manifesto appeared May 3d. The Bank of France has raised the rate of discount from 3 to 4½.

The Dutch Government had applied to the Chambers for a credit of £500,000.

A great many failures are reported on the Stock Exchange. Wolf and C. Berlin suspended.

A considerable number of failures at Vienna. It is expected that the imperishments and ruin at the Paris Bourse this week will be beyond example.

The ship Chambrone of the Seas arrived at Liverpool from Melbourne with £92,400.

In one fight they killed 500 of them, including 3 officers. The body of the rebels was still in Nepal.
