The Prince's Cortege being formed a long line of carriages followed to Carleton over the Suspension Bridge, which was gencr us hown open to the public on this occasion. The following is the hymn which was set to the music of a beautiful march, and was accompanied by showers of hoquets, with which the Prince and s lite, by their repeated acknowledgemonts, seemed to be much pleased. 
