This most melancholy disaster has thrown a deep gloom over the entire city, for although there can be no absolute certainty on the subject it is too much to be feared that among her ill-fated passengers there were several of our citizens, whose families and friends are overwhelmed with anxiety for their fate.

WRECK OF THE "HUNGARIAN"-Little additional information has been gathered, during the past week, concerning this melancholy affair and that little affords no hope that one single life was saved of all those on board that ill-fated ship at the time of her wreck. As to the number who were on board, we may here observe that the re-port, published in our last, as to the ship's clearance having been found, showing that there were over 360 passengers on board, has been since stated to be without sufficient foundation. No clearance can be found. Information receivedfrom Shelbourne County during the week states that portions of the wreck and cargo are found at various points on the coast on both sides of Cape Sable, from Ragged Islands round to Tusket. Three, and only three, bodies had been found-one, that of a man supposed to have been a stoker; another, a woman; and a child about two years old. There have also been picked up part of a hatbox, belonging to Wm. Boultenhouse son of Christopher Boultenhouse, Esq., Sackville, N. B.; a chest belonging to a Dr. Barrett, of New-York, containing a number of letters from his wife and daughter; three trunks belonging to Margaret Robertson, Montreal; one to Robert Martin, Toronto; and one to W. R. Crocker, Norwich, Connecticutt.-Acadian Recorder.

EUROPEAN NEWS

ARRIVAL OF THE ANGLO SAXON AT PORTLAND.

PORTLAND, March 1.

According to a St. Petersburg dispatch, Prince

Gortschakoff had informed the French Government that Russia does not consider the English proposals to be altogether a solution of the Italian difficulty, and that a real understanding could only result from a Conference of the Five Great Powers. It is said that the French Amabssador expressed to Prince Gortschakoff the readiness of this government to adhere to the proposals of Russia.

A Berlin dispatch says that Prussia would probably refuse to give her adhesion to the English

GREAT BRITAIN.

In the House of Lords on the 13th ult., the Duke of Newcastle, in rcply to a question of Lord Carnarvon, stated that until the resources of British Columbia were more fully developed and the interference of the government rendered absolutely hecessary, it was thought better not to put in force the act of last year in reference to the jurisdiction of the Hudson's Bay Company. Government hoped shortly to be enabled to effect an amicable arrangement with the Hudson's Bay Company which would bring the Red River and Iaskatchewan settlements under imperial control.

In the House of Commons Lord John Russell steted that the French and English Commissioners appointed to inquire into the Newfoundland fisheries, had reported to their respective governments.

Mr. B. Cochrane called attention to the state of relations with China, attributing the present difficulties to Lord Elgin's demand for a resident Minister at Pekin, which was most offensive to the Chinese. He severely denounced the arbitrary proceedings of Mr. Bruce and Admiral

Hope.

Lord John Russell defended the conduct of that if the Emperor of Mr. Bruce, and argued that if the Emperor of China had no objection to the ratification of the treaty at Pekin, he had no reason for opposing Mr. Bruce's entrance at the Peiho, which was the usual route. It was the intention of England and France to deal with the Chinese with the utmost forbearance; but he was sorry to say that the hopes of a satisfactory settlement were somewhat disappointed. He entreated the House to suspend its judgment until the result of the propositions made to the Emperor of China was made known. After some remarks by Sir. J. Pakington and Sir Delacy Evans, Lord Palmerston said he hoped the discussion might be suspended, on the understanding that the government would fully define its policy at the earliest possible op-portunity. The matter then dropped.

At the request of Lord Palmerston, Mr. Kinglake gave an unwilling consent to the postpone-ment of his motion relative to the annexation of Savoy to France. Lord Palmerston said that the consideration of the motion would be highly detrimental to the public interests in the present

state of negotiations.
