ITALY.

Despatches received on Monday announce the arrival of King Victor Emmanuel at Teano. which is about twenty miles to the north of Capua and which appears from the map to be about thirty miles east of Gaeta; and he is said to have had 25,000 men with him. On Friday last the 4th corps of the Piedmontese army and the troops of the fugitive King Francis had an engagement half-way between Teano and Sessa, and apparently therefore about four miles to the southeast of the formal place. After an action of two hours the Bourbonists fell back by Sessa up in the line of the river Garigliano, leaving many prisoners in the hands of the liberating forces. The intelligence received last week of the abandonment of Capua had already been shown to be premarure; but by this time probably the communication between Capua and Gaeta has been cut off, and but a short time must elapse before Gaeta will be completely surrounded.

The Eng ish Vo'unteers, who so recen'ly joined Garibaldi, and were sent immediately to the front, had the honour of repulsing a strong force of the enemy on the 19th inst., and eight of them were killed or wounded. The regiment was received at Naples with a popular ovation, and Garibaldi expressed the highest sa isfaction on their arrival at Caserta. The patience of the men seems to have been a good deal tried at fi st by a deficiency of rations. Major Styles, on landing at Naples, was put under arrest on a charge of extravagance in the expenditure of the funds entrusted to him; but he declared his readiness to meet the fullest investigation, and

The official return of the votes on the annexation question in the city and province of Naples, shows that out of 229,780 persons qualified to vote. 185.460 voted for annexation to Predmont, and 1,609 against it; leaving 42,711 neutrals, which is a much smaller proportion than was expected considering the amount of ignorance and fear, as well as habitual apathy, which existed King Victor Emmanuel d d not reach the city of Naples on the 28th, as was last week expected; and it was thought probable that he would wait until all the electoral returns had been published. One of the members of the Neapolitan deputation who went to present an address to the King of Sardinia, gives the following as the language used by his Majesty on the occasion; —
"I am notactuated by motives of personal am-

bition, but we must constitute an Italy. It maiters little to me whether I am king of 4,000,000 or 24,000,000 of people; but it is of great importance that a people belonging to the came race and speaking the same language should have the same country, and that country should be independent. If we only wish it we can be a great people. Austria continues to the aten me Not long since I received a note from her through the Emperor of the French which was full of passion. I care little for it. Austria let slip the favourable moment for attacking me. She is preparing for next spring, but then with your assistance, I shall have 400,000 men in arms, and Italians, thank God! still know how to fight. The Pops himself now write; to me with kindness. The powers of Europe are dis pleased; they are pouting, but none of them except Austria threatens. We are acting like persons in our own homes. Europe will at last recognise that we have justi e and right on out side. I am satisfied with Garibaldi : he may be a little capricious but Italy has no nobler spirit or son. I have several times offered to give hun artillery, but he refused the offer. He fla tered himself that he could take Capua by a bayanet charge. Tell your compatriots, gentlemen, that I shall not cease to be for all Italy what I have been for my little Piedmont. I shall perform my duty as king and soldier; let us all to our duty as Italians. Bear in mind that we do not vet possess the key of our house; but from this day forward we can say that Italy exists. Letus hope and persevere."

The subjoined note, dated Gaeta, the 5th of October, has been presented to the Emp-ror of Austria in private audience by Prince Petrol a, ambassader of the King of Naples. The same note has been sent to all the powers:-

" MEMORANDUM "At the moment of retiring from the capital to combat on the line of the Vulturno, the a iventurers who had urged on the revolution of which they were the promoters, and had invaded his territory, his Majesty the King of the kingdom of the Two Sicilies has ened to address to all the powers of E crops a formal protest against the acts of the adventurer Garibaldi, against the scandalous and unprincipled invasion, which, threatening he kingdom with speedy ruin, destroyed thus all the princples of public right, upon which the satery and independence of nations

But the states of Europe rave not deemed it incombent upon them, or in their interest, to oppose this invading march of the revolution, and the kingsom of the Two Sicilies heing left to its own strength, undermined by in-ternal treason, by attacks from without, and weakened by a situation in which Sard nia had a'l the advantages of the war without having its inconveniences and dangers, is in danger of succumbing. "But his overthrow cannot take place without opening a new era for Europe; the old treaties are abolished, a new public right is consecrated; the world is mide aw re, by our example, that revolutionary advantures are permitted not only to come and fight with armed bands against the best established thrones, but freely to navigate with their vessels this Mediterran an sea, where all the nations of the world have commercial and political interests. For four months Europe has seen, astonished but inactive, thousands of soldiers of the revoultion passing amid the squadrons of all the maritime nations in vessels laden with arm; and warlike stores; the herbours of a power in relations of peace and amity with the kingdom of the Two Sicilies serving as an asylum and inviolable refuge for those who came to invade our territory, and the flag of the Royal Sardinian many covering with impusity the fleet and battalions of the revolutionary chief, whose acts the government of King of Sardinia had disaproved officially, had accused of criminality and usurpation.
