FOREIGN NEWS.

NEWS BY THE "CANADA"

BRITAIN. The Queen and Prince Albert embarked at Gravesend for Antwerp the day the Canada left. The weather was again unfavorable for the crops.

On the 22d Garibaldi's armament had disembarked at the mouth of the Garigliano, interrupted the communication of the Royal troops between Capua and Gaeta. Garibaldi had been to Palermo, and published a fresh proclamation to the inhabitants, repeating that he will not accomplish the annexation at present. It is expected that on his return he will operate against Capua. An early capitulation of that place was anticipated. It is reported that Mazzini had arrived at Naples. Garibaldi appointed Signor Staffi prodictator of Sicily.

SARDINIA AND ROME.—The official Turin

Gazette gives a formal denial to the reports of certain letters having been received and answered by the King. The statement is nevertheless reiterated in the Turin correspondence and the substance of the reply is given. The King wrote his reply without consulting the Ministers, as it concerned them personally. It completely saves the dignity of the crown. He speaks in the language of a sovereign, justly hurt in his "armour propre" as man and King. He points out that he knows how to ressst the suggestions and influence of foreign powers even when menacing, and declared that he cannot comply with such strange pretensions comming from a man whose successes seem to mislead him.

The Sardinian Government notified Foreign Powers of the blockade of Ancona. The principles of maritime rights agreed upon at the Paris Congress, will be observed

It is reported that the Papal army was virtually disbanded after the defeat of Lamoriciere. The London Times regards it as no longer in existence, and argues that the four thousand men besieged in Ancona can have no motive for prolonging resistance, and may already be re-

It was reported that the Sacred College were exerting their influences to induce the Pope to quit Rome for Spain or Austria. The Dublin Evening News published a letter

from an Irish source stating that a great battle was fought outside of Perugia, which resulted in a Pontificial victory, the loss of the Piedmontese being over a thousand. This was prior to the attack on Perugia. FRANCE.—The Emperor and Empress returned

from Algeria. Bourse was firm and animated. Rentese advanced on the 21st nearly one half, closing at 68f. 55c. At the Royal meeting in Warsaw the Emperor of Austria and Regent of Prussia will not be accompanied by their Ministers. SICILY, GARIBALDI, ROME &C.

The political atmosphere of Italy is daily becoming more lowering. The cloud is dark, the thunder is heard, and no one can tell where the storm will finally burst.
