Moukhanoff President of the Commission of the Interior at Warsaw, and who possesses the whole civil power in Poland, so terrified the E peror during his say in Warsaw, that he appeared decided to renounce entirely the regime of clemency and moderation which, on his accession to the throne, he had caused to be introduced into the kingdom."

CHINA -The London and China Telegraph says, the latest report in circulation from Tient.i. is that Prince San-Kolinsin has been degraded, and that the Chinese have consented to pay an indemnity of £8,000,000 sterling.
