Accord-ing to the Globe this is the first vessel with a cargo that ever cleared at Toronto direct for any of the ports of the Lower Provinces.

LATEST FROM NEWFOUNDLAND .- The R. M. S. Ospray, Capt. Guilford, arrived at this Port on Monday morning last from St. Johns, via Sydney. We regret to learn that the Scal Fishery has this season proved anything but successful.—The result is expected to be a smaller fare than that o. last year, which was considerably below an average one. Both branches received the intimation with apparent delight and undisguised loyalty. Pre-parations on an extensive scale to receive the Royal visitor were immediately ordered to be made. Intimation has been received in St. Johns of the return of F. N. Gisbourne, Esq., from England with a staff of Engineers and mineralogists, for the purpose of instituting research into the hidden resources of Newfoundland. The firing of fog guns at Fort Amherst in foggy weather has been ordered to be discontinued after the 1st o. May. The attention of the Legislature has been called to the fact, and it is probable that some other arrangement will be made for the purpose of facilitating navigation. - Halifax Journal.

MEXICO.—According to the latest advices, Miramon still holds the city of Mexico, and the line of cities in the centre of the republic, running from Oriziba to Guadalajara, hut nothing more. It is understood, that if Miramon's steamer had not been taken by the U.S. vessels, he would not have been able to enter Vera Cruz.
