#### B. Telegraph to the News Room. THE LOST STEAMER HUNGARIAN

Little more is known of this unfortunate vessel, or of those who were on board it. Mitchel's Steamshiw Gazette states that when it left Liverpool there were 70 passengers, and other accounts say there were 38 eabin passengers. That Captain Boltenhouse was on board is beyond question, and it is equally certain that Mr. Galt, of Canada, was lucky enough to come out by another steamer.

Not another word from the Hungarian. Cutter " Daring," not arrived at the spot.

We have no further authentic news from the wreck. A report that the clearance had been found showing that 360 passengers were on board is not credited.

British ship Reformer, which cleared from New York for New Orleans, 22d ult, in ballast, has been wrecked on Abaco. She was built at St. John, N. B., two or three years since, was 963 English (1039 American) tons, and was rated A1 at Lloyds for 7 years. The R. cost \$50,000, and was insured for about \$35,000 in England and at St. John. N. B .- Globe.

## LATER FROM EUROPE.

#### FRANCE.

A telegram received from Paris on Sunday night implies that the annexation of Central Italy is not so nearly an accomplished fact as the rumour of last week made it. The proposal to allow the Italians to settle the question by vote has indeed been made, but, according to the Parisian account, the proposition was submitted by Eng-land to the French Government. The adoption of the principle of non-intervention, the new elections to determine the wishes of the Italian people, the withdrawal of the French troops from Central Italy and Rome, were all included in the diplomatic programme submitted to France by Lord Cowley; but the Emperor, before giving a definite answer to the English proposal, thought it indispensible to know the views of Austria, and the arangement cannot, therefore, be decided, either one way or the other, till the end of the week. The Pays of Friday, however, asserts that all the Powers are agreed on the adoption of a vote of universal suffrage as the means of testing the wishes of the Italians.

The oracle of the Constitutionnel has at last spoken on the Nice and Savoy question, and we learn from it that the rumours with which the public have litely been deluged are nothing but "presentiments of public opinion." The discus-sion has no official impulse, but it has drifted into its present position as a natural necessity. The Constitutional hints further that the "something" bring about a change will soon be made. which Lord John Russell, in his answer to a question on this subject, referred to has a real existence. "What the provinces can and will do," says this journal, " remains hidden under the veil of diplomacy." "The Emperor," it adds, with the ut-"I have to communicate to you to-day a fact of the very gravest kind, and which will probably be most faith in the imperial wisdom and power, " will not allow the European equilibrium to be the starting-point of important events. The Opinione, of Turin, on Saturday, takes the same view of the cession of Nice and Savoy, and says that the last elections in these places were certainly not favourable to their annexation to France. The Sardinian Government has placed implicit confidence in these provinces, and left them without soldiers, in order that their wish should be freely expressed ; but the expressions of the Opinione further clearly intimate that terms might be proposed on which the cession would be entertained. If Austria were to evacuate Venetia, and that province were to be united to Piedmont, the cession of Savoy to France might be asked for and might be granted, but these questions the Opinione thinks had better not be discussed at present.

In opposition to the wishes of the Emperor, as implied in the suppression of the Univers, for the publication of the encyclical letter of the Pope, the Papal document was read in all the churches of Paris on Sunday. This act was done in obe-dience to the orders of the Archbishop of Paris, who moreover ordered that public prayers should be offered till Easter, in order " that his Holiness may overcome the tribulations and persecutions to which the Church is now exposed."

#### ITALY.
