Canton, we visited all the places where foreigners in former years had been maltreated such as Fut-san, Wang-chuk--kee, and Cheng-shek. These places received us with all kindness as if old acquaintances; and as we went we preached in every place, from town to town and from viliage to village, no man forbidding us ; generally in the open air, frequently at the door of some temple, and not uncommonly in their ancestral halls. Our object was soon understood, hence the people were orderly and attentive generally, never treated us rudely or unkindly. Our confidence ripened into assurance that we were as secure from insult or injury while preaching to them as we would be in our native land under like circumstances. The country where we travelled was beautiful, level, rich, well watered and fertile. The people were generally found living happily together in villages, and seemed to need nothing but the change from idolatry to Christianity, to make them the most happy, contented and prosperous of people.'

The three commissioners who negotiated the treaty of Tien-sing "offered of their own accord," Mr. Reed tells us, " to concede to missionaries access to all parts of the country." In view of the opportunity thus offered for introducing the gospel into China, "Christians," as Bishop Boone of Shanghae, well says, "have not had such a call to labor in any country since the days of the apostles. May they have wisdom to understand their duty, and grace to perform it." According to Mr. Roberts, the Canton missions now number 16 foreign missionaries; 11 native preachers : 58 native members ; (36 received in 1859 ; 16 of whom are females) 11 chapels 2 hospitals; 4 physicians and 6 schools; with 147 male and 36 female pupils. The whole number of missionaries t) China since Dr. Morrison in 1807, fifty three years ago, has been 213 male ; of whom there remain 81. By these native Churches have been organized at the several ports and varions out stations ; the number of members in them probably exceeds a thousand, and many have died in the faith, and in the confident hope of eternal life. A wide spread spirit of inquiry has been awakened, and the number of conversions is every year increasing. There is every encouragement to increase effort. Every thing concurs to produce the conviction that a great work of divine grace is ere long to be witnessed in China.

#### **RELIGION IN THE PALACE.**

One of the speakers at a mission meeting in Leicester, Eugland, gave some information concerning tip teachers and nurses to whom is intrusted the training of the children of the Royal family. The monthly nurse in the Queen's household, he stated, was a member of Dr. Steane's (Baptist) church, at Camberwell. The Princess Royal, now the Princess Frederick William, was awakened through reading a sermon of Adolpha Monod, and became throughly religious. When the last child was born, a Wesleyan was selected for nurse. The teacher of the Prince of Wales, Mr. Gibbs, was a Nonconforpious people.

### THE JAPANESE EMBASSY.

N., volunteered to assist the Japanese officers in making the voyage over the, to them, untried ocean. The Chief Admiral of the Imperial Japanese Navy comes by this vessel. She will remain here until the Powhattan arrives, and then return at once to Jeddo, to report the arrival of the Ambassadors and suite thus far on their journey. The people at San Francisco are delignted at this manifestation of good feeling on the part of the Japanese Government, and will do everything possible to entertain their visitors, hoping thereby to stimu-late the lucrative trade which has already commenced between this country and the Empire of Japan.-Ex.



At least 100 buildings have been destroyed, including all the Hotels except English's; the Banks, Mechanics' Institue, Town Hall, Telegraph Office, Printing, Offices, all the Stores on North side of the Bridge. The loss is probably £80,000-Insurance some £20,000. Most of the effects lost after removal to a supposed place of safety.

FURTHER FROM WOODSTOCK.—A despatch was received yesterday from the Mayor of Woodstock by the Mayor of this City, which says :—
