

regarded them favourably; reports had been current that meeting of Corps Legislative was to be hastened, but Payes says meeting will not take place before the usual time. Senate, however, will meet earlier to regulate execution of recent Imperial decree.

Bourse firm—70-35.  
French troops in Syria were taking up winter quarters.  
ITALY.—Garrison of Gaeta made sortie in order to capture the strategical positions in its suburbs, but was repulsed with great loss.  
GAETA, 19th.—Piedmontese fleet had returned to Naples. Intention being to make an attack on land side. Advanced Piedmontese posts were 1500 men from mole and forts; they were placing 1500 men in line to open fire, and three out of five batteries construction were ready; the battery kept up fire to impede construction of batteries; but, unfortunately, Typhus fever prevailed in garrison which was too crowded—numbering 18,000. Piedmontese numbered 15,000.  
State of siege established in the Abruzzi—all persons bearing arms without permission exciting paranoxy or insulting national flag, are to be shot.  
Cavour's reply to recent Prussian despatch in which Prussian policy was censured, is published. Cavour insists that question of Umbria, Marches and Sicilies is purely Italian, in no way affecting rights of other powers—he points out that Sardinia is the only conservative power in Italy—capable of overcoming really revolutionary spirit, and warmly appeals for European sympathy, instead of rebuke. Forty volunteers from Duchy of Castro invaded the town of Aquilone, they dispersed and imprisoned Pontifical General's Aems, and hoisted Arms of Savoy. Commercial convention ratified between Sardinia and Hanse Town.

AUSTRIA.—Serious disturbance with loss of life reported at Debresin and Eperies, Hungary twenty-sixth?  
Paris correspondent to London Post telegraph says no government has made any overture to Austria respecting cession or purchase of Venetia.  
PRUSSIA.—M. Stieber, Director of Police, has been dismissed.

### Arrival of the Bohemian.

ST. JOHN'S, N. F., Dec. 16th.  
The Bohemian from Liverpool 6th, was intercepted off Cape Race at 4 P. M., on Sunday.  
BRITAIN.—The London Chronicle says Parliament will meet on the 5th of February, and Reform Bill has not yet been discussed by Cabinet.  
A Deputation, which includes two members of Parliament, have been appointed to convey invitation to Garibaldi to visit England.  
Times publishes full details of expedition of Bull Dog and Fox for ascertaining the feasibility of projected North Atlantic Telegraph Route. Results pronounced highly satisfactory and encouraging.  
The Times has another editorial upon political split in the United States, and expresses a hope that the quarrel may give way to a calm, in which the real difficulties of the Slavery question may be met and quietly answered.

FRANCE.—Marshall Villant has been elected Minister of Emperor's household.  
It is stated that no one was aware of Emperor's purpose respecting decree relative to Constitution until he revealed the document to the astonished Ministers in Council, where it met with some opposition.

Bombardment of the 3th was rather heavy and lower, Renter 76.

ITALY.—Siege of Gaeta continues. The garrison replied to the fire from the batteries of Civitella. Four batteries commenced operations.  
Count of Syracuse died suddenly at Pisa on the 4th of Apoplexy.  
The Consulta Generale had opened at Naples. Government explanations to Consulta produced good impressions. Propria was elected Vice President of Consulta, after having refused post of Minister without Portfolio.

Gen. Heurdeck inspected the Austrian Fortresses of Venetian Littoral, also the assembled officers at Venice, and told them to prepare for eventualities of energetic defence.

PRINCIPALITIES.—Fears are entertained of general rising of Little Wallachia. Twenty principal merchants at Craiova killed by militia during a disturbance. The Archbishop and President of Council were arrested at Jassy.  
INDIA.—Bombay mails to Nov. 10th arrived. News generally anticipated. At Bombay business had suspended in consequence of bazaar, dealers having combined to suspend all purchases till authorities paid attention to the grievance of the income tax.

CALCUTTA, Nov. 9th.—Exchange two, one, freights to London 45 to 55 shillings.

FINANCIAL FRAMES.—Funds continued buoyant on the 5th. Consols advanced one fourth, but was partially lost to b. force close. Financial advices from New York anxiously watched; those by Prince Albert were contradictory and produced but slight effect. Discount market moderately active, supply was adequate to demand. Best bills 4 1/2. Business at Bank moderate—no gold withdrawn on the 5th.

Ship Suffolk, with two days late news from Melbourne, and £125,000 in gold reached English Channel. Advices not landed.

Wm. Moran, an extensive Contractor at London had suspended. Thus, Piper & Son, old and extensive building firm, also in difficulty.

The improvement in American railway securities continued on the 5th. Illinois and Erie being especially in demand.  
Consol. 93 1/4, money and account.—Broad-stuff of all qualities slightly declined. Provisions dull.
