It was argued that the prisoner was intoxicated at the time; but he told them solemnly that this was no justification or palliation of the crime. The law provides that it shall not be, and well it is so, or there would soon be an end to all lav, for then a man intent on crime would only have to influence bis passions and excite himself to madness by means of drink, and commit crime with impunity. After reading and commenting on the evidence, pointing out that the parties were tra-ced to five o'clock in the morning, and that no quarrel had taken place and nothing had occur-red to excite the prisoner unless it was the use of language described by Smith, but which would seem tobe no unusual language in that locality, and the prisoner took it coolly. In support of the Attorney General's hypothe sis, there were he remarked the facts that Munford was half an hour in the house in the morning before the deceased came in, that she said that Smith had cut her fingers, that Smith had given no account of this, nor of the manner in which that half hour had been spent. The cutting of the hair also seemed to him enaccountable, unless as an act of jealousy. He remarked that the evidence of the Medical men as to the bruises and marks on the body corroborated the statement of the women as to the manner in which the deceased had been

He concluded by again adjuring the jury to do their duty fairly and honestly, uninfluenced against the prisoner by the enormity of the crime or by anything they might have heard outside the jury box: uninfluenced in his favor by any sympathy for his father or his friends, regardless of consequences to individuals with which they end he had nothing to do, they should discharge the duty they owed to the country, to society, to their families, and to themselves, for if crime were to go unpunished; if a proper administra-tion of the laws no longer afforded protection to life, civilized society must be disorganized and all law and order come to an end. He felt confident that they would weigh the evidence carefully and decide fairly. If they believed the statements made by the witnesses, he repeated that this was not a case of Manslaughter, but was a case of Murder. If they thought there was anything to justify the act, that was entirely for them to say. He had endeavored to per-form his duty; he hoped they would not shrink from doing theirs.

The Jury retired about half-past one. The crowd remained about the Court House all the afternoon, and the impression . which prevailed amongst the crowd from the first that the Jury would not agree, grew stronger. About six o'clock they came into Court and returned a verdict of GUILTY, accompanied with a recommendation to Mercy.
