ARRIVAL AT BOSTON OF THE PIRATE YACHT "WANDERER."

THE CAPTAIN SHORT OF SUPPLIES CHASES SEVE-RAL VESSELS.

REMARKABLE ADVENTURES ON THE VOYAGE.

His story to the Inhabitants of the Western Isles.

HE OBTAINS STORES AND KIDNAPS TWO WOMEN.

HIS CREW TAKE THE VESSEL AND SAIL FOR HOME.

The history of this famous or infamous vessel has already occupied a large share of public at-tention on account of her successful slaving voyage, and the acquittal of all concerned in it. she is again before the public, and is again in the clutches of the law, this time, we hope, without

a chance of escape. This morning she arrived here in charge of Mr. Henry Welton, from the vicinity of the Western Islands. Her story, though long in its details may be briefly summed up. On the 20th of Oc-tober she left the vicinity of Savannah without a Custom House clearance, under the command of Capt. Lincoln Patten, of Bath, who forced part of the men on board to go to sea. She went to Flores, obtained some supplies of water and provisions, but requiring more, went to sea and spoke a French barque, the master of which pro-mised the desired supplies. Patten, with a boat and four men, went on board of her; and then Mr. Henry Welton, with

the consent of the crew, took command, left the Captain on board the barque, and shaped the Wanderer's course for the United States. She is now in charge of the Custom House authori-ties; but will be delivered to to the District Attorney. This is the story in brief; we will now present some of its details, which are quite inter-

Un the 20th of October, between 9 and 10 o'clock, Lincoln Patten under the assumed name of David Martin, put 15 men on board the yacht Wanderer, then lying in the River below Savan-nah, to assist in taking on board provisions, wa-ter and stores. A little later he came on board himself, accompanied by Edward Talbot, and Capt. J. Black, shipping agent. He called all hands to get under way, and drawing a revolver, swore he would shoot any one who refused to work, or who might interrupt his movements. He also threatened the shipping agent and pilot with death if they attempted to leave the vessel. Some of the crew who knew his plans, loaded the two guns with grape, and armed themselves to enforce his orders against those who had been induced by false pretences to come on board.

Though there was a pilot on board, he directed the movements of the vessel himself, and got her twice ashore. At last she reached Tabee Light, and anchored, when the pilot and shipping-master left her. Again she ran aground, and remained aground four hours. At nine o'clock in the morning of October 21, she floated again, made sail, slipped fifteen fathoms of chain and went to sea, carrying more than half the crew against their wishes.

He next chased the barque Clara Brewer, but when he hailed her, finding the captain to be an old acquaintance, he did not go on board.

The next day he saw a schooner and made sail in chase, carrying such a press of canvass that he carried away his square sail yard and split the sail, but failed to overhaul her. On the 28th of October he chased a brig and fired grape at her, but she would not heave to ; the chase was continued until 11 P. M., when the brig, favored by the darkness of the night, by suddenly changing her course ran out of sight.

The Wanderer was now headed for Fayal, and was favored with a strong gale from W. N. W., going sometimes twenty knots an hour, and re-quiring two men at the helm to steer her. On the 31st the gale moderated to fine weather, which continued until November 9th, when she encountered another North-west gale, which brought her to the Isle of Flores.

She stood off, and on firing guns for a pilot, and when off the settlement of Santa Cruz, the British Consul, the Chief Magistrate of the place and pilot came on board. She was then anchored in twenty-five fathoms water. The Captain produced a false clearence of the vessel, under the name of the " William, of Savannah, bound to Smyrana," stating at the same time that he had lost sails, provisions, spars, galley, and chro-nometer, and was in want of all these.

Endorsed by the British Consul and the autho-rities ashore, he procured thirty-eight casks, con-taining 4,000 gallons of water, firewood, liquor, flour, rope, 250 bushels of potatoes, an anchor, and 120 fathoms of chain.

He was promised twenty tons more flour, but some of his movements exciting suspicion, he came on board in great haste, and made every thing ready for getting under weigh that night. He smnggled two Portuguese women on board, and this circumstance came to the knowledge of the authorities. He had not a moment to spare, so he slipped sixty fathoms of chain, left one of so he shipped sixty lations of chain, fetchar or his men ashore, and did not pay one dollar for the supplies received, valued at about fifteen hundred dollars. He openly avowed to the crew that he could procure eighty negroes for the wo-

men he had kidnapped. The vessel was next headed for Maderia, called at Village Point de Salee, but unable to obtain supplies, proceeded to Funchal, where receiving information that an English steamer of war was

information that an English steamer of war was in the harbor, he stood to sea, proposing to pass between Cape St. Ana and the Canaries. Still short of provisions, he declared to the crew that he would obtain them by force from the first vessel he met, stating that he would shoot the first man who hesitated to fight for such an object.

Shortly afterwards he spoke the barque Clara, of Bordeaux, but her commander positively re-fused either to heave to or to furnish him with supplies. Two other barques were chased with-out being able to bring them to. At last she fell in with the barque Tenney, of Marseilles, which hove to, and promised to give him some of her stores. With a boat and four men he boarded
