CANADA.

There is now in progress in the Eastern Town-ships a revival of the temperance movement, the unmistakable effect of two causes : 1st. Sundry prosecutions of rumsellers for vending without a cence, instituted by the Revenue Inspector of the St. Francis District, in accordance with a municipal bye-law; and 2nd.,—The deplorable local and general results of intemperance, which have stimulated the friends of sobriety through-out the entire region to renewed effort. The consequence, has thus far, been an uprising against the drinking usages, and in favor of a general pro-hibitory law, which has reinspired good men, and is already disseminating a healthy reaction in favor of total abstinence outside the district, the like of which has not been experienced for many a day. -Canada Advocate.

THE CALAMITY AT LAWRENCE. The daily papers continue to be filled with details and incidents concerning the recent terrible calamity at Lawrence, together with reports of the testimony given before the corroner's jury,

which is still in session at our last reports.

We continue to read of heart-rending incidents connected with this sad tragedy. We are told of a young and beautiful girl, who, busy at work in one of the upper stories of the mill at the time of the crash, was thrown down by a piece of shafting, which fell across her neck, preventing her from rising. As the shaft was prevented from bearing heavily upon her neck, she could watch with comparative ease, and the confidence of delivery, the efforts of her rescuers to extricate her. But, alas! the flames came first, and claimed her for their victim.

There is another incident told of a little girl who was entangled in the ruins beyond hope of rescue. The cruel flames came crackling towards her, and as a companion near her was rescued. and being borne away, the little doomed heroine took her time bill from her pocket, and handing it to her companion, scorched by the flames between, she said: "You will be saved, I shall not; give this to my father and say good bye to him for me."

The dead-room at the City Hall witnessed many thrillingly mournful scenes. A husband who had searched anxiously for his missing wife, examined a charred and mishapen mass brought into the room for the dead, and upon the fingers of the skeleton of the hand he found the wedding ring, engraven with his own name, which he had placed on the hand of a happy bride. He was borne from the sad scene raving like a maniac. A mo-ther who had lost a child came on Saturday afternoon, leading a younger daughter and bring-ing a miniature likeness of the lost one with which to seek the original among the dead. The miniture was that of a blooming and beautiful young lady. On a shapeless body, from which the face was burned away, the mother saw a fragment of the dress which her daughter had worn, and knew she had found the body of her child.—She faintedand was borne away. There were other scenes as affecting as these, but we have not space for

The deepest feeling with regard to this terrible event prevails in Lawrence. It was made a subject of discourse in nearly all the churches of the city last Sunday. On Saturday the Mayor issued a proclamation appointing Tuesday, as a day of prayer, and it was to be observed as such in all

The body of Mr. L. F. Branch, the missing overseer, was found one Sunday, and was but slightly disfigured. Up to Sunday evening 72 bodies had been brought to the City Hall. 51 of them had been recognized, 12 buried not identified, and 9 removed.

We shall give the result of the coroner's inquest as soon as we ascertain it, and defer all remark upon the probable causes of the catastrophe

The latest reports give the following state-ment of the number of the dead, wounded and missing;

Dead, Injured severely, 119 Injured slightly, 200 Missing,

A few more bodies may perhaps be found in the ruins, and the remainder of the missing will doubtless be accounted for by those who went to their homes immediatly after the accident, without reporting themselves to the authorities. WALKING ON RAILBOAD TRACKS.—The Boston Journal says that the custom of walking on railroad tracks is a most reprehensible one, and results in the frequent loss of life. Scarce aday elapses that we are not called upon to record some fatal disaster from this cause. The danger of the practice is forcibly illustrated in an exchange paper which we have looked over, and which reports the death of five persons, in various places, who were killed by railroad trains while walking on the tracks.

OUT OF DEBT.—The American Baptist Missionary Union announces itself clear of debt: It needs \$50,000 to meet the expenses of the next three months, and the Baptist community will undoubtedly be stimulated by the successful management of their mission funds to a new and enlarged liberality. The Union has now an op-portunity to demonstrate the soundness of the policy of keeping its expenses within its income, and unless we are mistaken in human nature, it will be found the most productive policy.

Thomas Babington Macaulay was the son of Zachary Macaulay, a wealthy merchant in the African trade, who distinguished himself by a Wilberforce, in their efforts for the emancipation eration with Clarkson and of the slave. Young Macaulay was educated at Trinity college, Cambridge, and there gained several of the highest University honors, and was throughout his course distinguished by his indus-try and rare capacities. In 1822 he commenced the study of law at Lincoln's Inn, London, entering the bar three years after. It was in the first year of his admission to the bar, that his celebrated essay on Milton was published in the Edinburgh Review, gaining for him immediate notice as a brilliant and graceful writer. In 1832 he was returned to Parliament, where he was soon prominent as a speaker, and as a sagacious and practical statesman; so that in 1834, on the accession of the Whigs to the government, he was made secretary of the India Board. After continuing a short time at this post, he resigned, and left for India as a member of the Supreme Council, in which position he remained three years, and then returned to England, to become again a successful candidate for Parliament. He was in this body until 1847. As a principal authority on juestions relating to India, as a weighty counselor on matters of domestic policy, and as a fluent and fervid orator, he was ever prominent in Par-liament. He acted with the Whig party, and was naturally an earnest partisan.
