BY THE U. S. FLEET AND ARMY .- New York, Sep. 1 .- The Tribune's special Washington dispatch gives the following particulars of the Hatteras expedition :---

On Wednesday, the Minnesota, Wabash Cumberland, Susquehannah, Pawnee, Harriet Lane and Monticello and transport steamers Adelaide and Peabody, with numerous tugs arrived off Hatteras Inlet. The fleet was in command of Commodore Stringham, and the land forces under Gen, Butler. Two forts had been erected by the rebels to guard the mouth of Hatteras Inlet, which commands the entrance to the Pamlico and Albermarle Sounds, which affords connection thus to Virginia and the sea. The bombardment was commenced at 11 o'clock in the morning by the Minneso-ta, the whole fleet soon joining. The landing of troops also immediately commenced, but owing to the serf only three hundred were enabled to land. The forts replied to the incessant cannonade without much damage, and after three hours the flag on Fort Clark was hauled down and the rebels retreated to Fort Hatteras, a large work below. Our land forces soon occupied the abandoned fort and hoisted the stars and stripes. At night the fleet an-chored, several gunboats remaining as near as possible to protect the land force. At 8 o'clock on Thursday morning the fleet again opened a concentrated fire on Fort Hatteras, the shots from the latter falling far short. At 114 o'clock, our shots beginning to play on the magazine, the rebels hoisted a white flag,

Fort Clark, and were met on the beech by a flag of truce. the fort, when Commodore Barron, late of the Federal Navy, who was in command, proposed a capitulation by allowing the garrison to stack

arms, and allow the officers to retain their side arms. General Butler refused to accede to such terms, and demanded an unconditional surrender, which was subsequently acceded to. Com. Barron delivered his sword to Commo-

five hundred knapsacks, a large quantity of mu-nitions, and about seven hundred prisoners were captured. Not one on our side was hurt. Four hundred men had reinforced the forts the night

On Thursday forenoon a steamer with one thousand rebels approached, but was kept away by our force in Fort Clarke.

After the capture our troops were all landed, and Gen. Butler had the stars and stripes hoist-ed amid the wildest cheering, the band playing Yankee Doodle. The prisoners and wounded were put on board the Minnesota, which will take them to Narr Yack take them to New York.

REBELS RISING IN WESTERN VIRGINIA .---GREAT EXCITEMENT AMONG THE PEOPLE .---WHEELING, Va., Sept. 1-8 P. M. - There is considerable excitement here to night, conse-quent on a dispatch just received from Fairmount, Marion County, by the Governor, that a large number of rebels had risen in the back country, and were marching on that town to burn it and tear up the railroad track. Drums are beating to arms, the streets are crowded, and the Governor is dispatching the Home Guard and volunteer citizens to Fairmount. The train is about ready start. The rising is supposed to be in concert with some move-ment of Gen. Lee's. All the Federal troops have lately gone forward from Fairmount. It is feared that the movement among the rebels may be general, and a large number of citizens here are going on patrol to-night.

ENGLAND AND THE REBEL CONFEDERACY. -A report was telegraphed from New York yesterday to the associated press "advices from Mr. Adams indicate a speedy recognition of the Southern Confederacy by the British. Government." The report caused some depression of feeling in State Street, though was not generally credited. It was based upon the following extract from the Washing-ton correspondence of the "Tribune," which scarcely bears out the telegraphic report: "Mr. Adams, Minister at St. James's writes

that in the British mind the independence of the Rebels is fully admitted as a military and political necessity; that their acknowledg-ment by England is but a question of time and prudent courtesy. That while Britain is impatient to get cotton from the South, in exchange for manufactured goods, she is anxious not to lose Northern markets, and is unwilling to part with the hope of breaking down the Morrill Tariff, by the same means with which she chained the North with the Walker Tariff; and that two or three more successes like that of Bull Run, would entitle the Slaveocracy to immediate recognition."

There is reason to suspect that this report was set on foot by unserupulous stock jobbers for effect upon the markets.—Boston Journal. MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS.




