This measure is well calculated to allay popular apprehension, by convincing the people that the supply of real money can be made equal to all their wants, while, by its extension to the banking institutions of the country, we might secure the advantages of a safe currency, without any centralization of monetary power."

The tide of emigration from Ireland may be aid to have ceased to flow. Emigrant vessels epart from some of our ports without a single, migrant. It appears from the report of the Emiration Commissioners that the entire emigration om the United Kingdom in 1860 was only 128 69 persons. Though this was 8.037 more than the previous year, it was 31,659 less than the the previous year, it was 31,659 less than the average of the preceding five years. Of the aggregate number 21,596 were from Ireland—a small proportion compared with former years. Mr. Buchanan, the principal emigration agent, classes the emigration to Canada from the United Kingdom, exclusive of foreigners who embarked at English ports, as follows:—English, 2,491; Scotch, 2,830; Irish, 2,831. He estimates the arrivals in Canada through the United States at about 4,800. Steamers carry most of the emigrants now. Of 7,856 who went to St. Lawrence, only 904 went by sailing vessels. Among the steerage passengers by steamers there was but one death in the year, and there were three in the sailing vessels. This fact presents a gratifying contrast to the morta-
