manners, and for overt general wickedness -men sunk in immorality and obdurate in crime, reclaimed from such enormities, subdued, converted, animated with joy and peace in believing, not to mention others less ostensibly depraved and vicious! Thousands of these, together with many a conceited pharisee and rationalist, "plucked as brands from the burning," have been added to the different churches within a few months, and as many have enrolled themselves on the list of probationers for church-tellowship.

NUMBERS ADDED TO THE CHURCHES.

To the churches of our denomination alone, it is supposed that to the present date, not fewer than from fifteen hundred to two thousand real converts have been added, and full ten thousand to our stated congregations as inquirers, making a probable aggregate of nearly twelve thousand souls. The total accession to the churches of Christ generally, can hardly be estimated at less than thirty thousand, and this from the scattered and limited population our island contains.

On the part of those personally, who have been thus brought under the influence of the truth, there has been apparent a powerful conviction of sin-sincere and full confession of it as committed, both against God and their fellow-men—great earnest-ness in prayer—striking evidences of pardon and peace, and great activity and zeal for God.

In a day or two the demoralizing effect of these places will be effectually checked, and the soldiers restored to order and

Gen. Scott is reported, upon excellent authority, to have said to the President that he had acted like a coward for the first time in his life in yielding to the urgency of the public, the press, and members of Congress, and advancing upon Manassas before he was ready.

EXCITING DEBATE IN CONGRESS -MR. RI-CHARDSON, OF ILLINOIS, MAKES SOME IMPOR-TANT DICLOSURES .- Washington, July 24 .-The debate in the House to-day between Messrs. Burnett, Richardson, Blair and Stevens was highly exciting and interesting. Mr. Richardson concluded his speech as follows :-"I repeat that Gen. Scott has been forced to fight this battle: I will tell the gentleman what occurred yesterday morning. My col-leagues, Messrs. Logan and Washburne, and myself, were present with the President, the Secretary of War, and Gen. Scott. In the course of our conversation Gen. Scott remarked: 'I am the biggest coward in the world.' I rose from my seat. 'Stay,' said Gen. Scott; 'I will prove it. I have fought the battle against my judgment, and I think the President ought to remove me to day for doing it.

As God is my Judge, he addded, after an interval of silence, 'I did all in my power to make the army efficient, and I deserve removal because I did not stand up when I could and did not.' I stand here to vindicate Gen. cott. I am indebted to the gentleman of Missouri for the compliment he paid me. I desire to say for myslef that I stand here the last of a generation, my father and grandfather having fallen beneath the flag of their country. I too, have fought under its folds at home and abroad, and, God willing. I will stand till the end of my life defending it against all foes." Mr. Washburne-As my collegue has refered to Gen. Scott's remarks, he might allude

Mr. Richardson—I will do so : "Your conversation implies," said the President to Gen. Scott, "that I forced you to battle." To which Gen. Scott replied, "I have never served under a President who has been kinder to me than you have been." But Gen. Scott did not relieve the President from the fact of the latter having forced him to fight the battle. Gen. Scott thus paid a compliment to the President personally. I desire to say of the President, that I have known him from boyhood. It you let him alone he is an honest man—[laughter] but I am afraid he has not the firmness to stand up against the politicians around him.

GREAT BRITAIN.

The proceedings in both houses of Parliament last night possess considerable interest. In the Upper Chamber the Earl of Carnarvon preferred a complaint against the American Customs authorities for opening and searching British packages sent to Canada by way of Portland. We presume that this complaint is well grounded, for it is an annoyance which we should not expect the American Government to countenance when the fact is brought under its notice. The Duke of Newcastle, who takes the colonies under his especial protection, appeared to know nothing about it, and the ington yesterday, to take command of the Army of the Potomac, recently commanded by Brigadier General McDowell.
