TERRIBLE TORNADO. - A terrific tornado passed over Matroon, Ill., on the 23d instant. It was accompained by tremendous discharges of electricity from a dense black cloud. The earth fairly shook. The tornado unroofed and blew down buildings and carried away everything moveable in its path. A loaded freight train on the Illiniois Central Railroad was lifted bodily and turned over beside and across the track. Some of the curs were smashed to splinters, others were merely unroofed. One car was carried holf a mile. Bales of cotton, hogsheads of tobacco, barrels of flour and fragments of the cars were strewn over a large extent on either side of the track. The clearing of the ruins occupied the whole night. Singularly no one was hurt during all the commotion.

SHERIDAN'S OWN ENGLISH. CEDAR CREEK, Oct. 10, 1864.-10 P. N. To Lieut. Gen. Grant, City Point.

I have the honor to report that my army at Cedar Greek was attacked this morning before daylight, and my left was turned and driven in confusion. In fact, most of the line was driven in confusion

with the loss of twenty pieces of artillery.

Others of the gang then went to the vault and drawers and laid violent hands on all the specie, bills, and other articles which they could find, and filled the side satchels which each wore, as we before described. Of course, resistance was useless, for the surprise was complete. At the Franklin County Bank, the raiders locked the cashier, Mr. Beardsley, up, and the prisoners were not released until late in the night.

A REIGN OF TERROR.

Then commenced a reign of terror in the village. terrible while it lasted. The thirty or more marauders rushed up and down the streets firing their pistols in every direction. Wherever they saw a citizen or group of men they would aim in that direction.
