bas ENGLISH AND CONTINENTAL.

The European News says, with Queen continues to be oppressed with the terrible loss she sustained in the death of the Prince Consort. The second anniversary of her bereavement was passed, on the 14th inst., in strict seclusion. A religious service took place early in the morning in the Royal Mau-soleum, at Forgmore, attended by Her Majesty and several of her children, who placed on the tomb wreathes of evergreens and immortelles. Her Majesty makes frequent visits to the mausoleum, and custom, so general in France and other contimemory of the departed, seems likely, from this high example, of being introduced into England."

The Insurance Record observes that several officers in London are accepting proposals for an insurance to a large amount on the life of the Empress of the French. The risk is being divided among French and English officers, and the total amount of insurance is £200,000.

M SUPERVEILLE, who had arrived in Paris in the character of "Special Envey from the Confederate States," is a Frenchman by birth, and was formerly an advocate in the south of France. He has been living in Texas for the last 17 years, and is now a naturalized American. He got away from Matamoras on board a Freuch ship of war, which the Admiral lent him to go to Vera Cruz, where he embarked in the French steamer Florida for St. Nazaire. He is said to have a mission to notify to the French Government the recognition by the Confederate States of the Empire of Mexico, and also to try to persuade Napoleon to recognize the South in return.

The war in New Zealand is still in progress. The Melbourne Argus of the 24th October, says: We are told that General Cameron is trying to trap the rebels into a general engagement at Mere-mere, and that an attack upon the native fortifications at that important spot is imminent; but at present we have only heard of light brushes with the enemy, from which we have, in effect, been compelled to retire. The first affair took place on September 8, at pah built on Camerontown on the Waikato, manned by Maori refugees, allies of the Queen, and used as a store for the provisions before being brought up the river in canoes. News of the disaster was at once conwayed to the military stationed at Toakau, and, in the hope of intercepting the enemy, Captain Swift, with Lieutenant Butler and a party of 50 men of the 65th regiment, started to meet them. As they were advancing through the bush they heard the sound of men's voices speaking the native language. Upon this, with a knowledge that the enemy consisted of about 200 men of the Ngatimaniapoto tribe, Captain

Swift deemed it advisable to throw his men into am-bush. This was done, but, after waiting some time, as the enemy did not approach, the order was given to fix bayonets, and proceed along the track into the open, when suddenly a volley was fired into them, and Captain Swift fell, being hit below the heart. Almost immediately afterwards Lieutenant Butler, who was second in command, fell also, and was instantly surrounded by the enemy, two of whom he levelled with his revolver. The command now devolved upon Sergeant M'Kenna, who led the men on to the charge, assisted by Sergeants Bracegirdle and Meare; the Maories now showed themselves on a hill,

but were repulsed three times. It being by this time dark our men retired into the bush, two staying to guard the body of Captain Swift, whom they afterwards hid in the bush. The casualties in this affair on our side were: —Killed, Captain Swift; Privates S. Grace and R. Bellringer. Wounded—Lieutenant Butler, dangerously; Private P. Powell, severely; Private M'Lean. Captain Swift was a brave and dashing officer, and much respected in the 65th, to which he had not been very long promoted. He was previously in the 80th and 81st, serving with the former in the Burmese war of 1852-3, including the expedition to the relief of Kangeen, in August, 1853, for which he received a medal. "General Cameron was completing his final arrangements for an attack on Meremere, and had summoned all the medical officers to head quarters at Pokeno. UNITED STATES The Army estimates for 1864 provides for 80 regi-ments in the regular army, and 1,166 regiments and

ments in the regular army, and 1,166 regiments and 175 batteries in the volunteer army, the combined force comprising 166 regiments of cavalry, 47 regiments and 174 batteries of artillery, 980 regiments of infantry and four regiments of engineers. Allowing but 500 men to the regiment and 50 men to the battery it would give nearly 600,000 men; reckoning 1,000 men to the regiment and 100 to the battery, the sum would be nearly 1,200,000 men.

The Northern papers state that the rebels are running large quantities of supplies from Maryland, across the Upper Potomac. Parties find little or no difficulty in crossing at Berlin and Point of Rocks, and an extensive trade is going on between Baltimore and London. It is known that goods have been received at Orange Court House by this route, and communication between the rebels and their sympathizers in Maryland scarcely meets with interruption. There is reason to believe that there is now more smuggling over this route than there has been at any period on the Chesapeake bay or the Lower Potomac.
