CLEANING MILK VESSELS.

A correspondent of the Cincinnati Gazette says there is no product of the farm that presents so much difference as butter. This arises chiefly from using vessels for holding milk and utensils in making the butter which are soured. In my notice of the effects of having soured troughs in sugar-making, I stated that acidity was fatal to good sugar-making. It is not less so in butter-making. Milk has a peculiar acid, very easily formed, which entirely takes away that rich, sweet, fine flavor belonging to good butter. A very little soured milk or cream on vessels rapidly generates enough acid to take it away. To avoid this, great care is requisite. Cleanliness only is not sufficient in having the vessels well washed, but they must be carefully washed in boiling hot water, and should be boiled in it also. But as cream is very apt to stick, even in good washing, when the vessels are boiling in water some pearlash or soda should be put in it, which destroys any acidity that may be about the vessels. They should then be sunned. I have known some good butter makers who dispensed with the sunning when soda was used, but both are to be reommended.

BRUISED OATS FOR HORSES.

A horse fed upon whole oats and uncut hay, xpends a large proportion of his motive power in the process of mastication. After a hard day's work he has before him the task of reducing to pulp 15 or 20 pounds weight of hard food, and the operation is carried on during the hours which onoht to be devoted to repose. Not unfrequently is the animal so tired that he is unable to properly chew his food : he, therefore, bolts the cars, a large proportion of which passes un-changed through his body. Those who desire to render fully effective the motive power of the horse, must pay attention to the mechanical state as well as to the quality and quantity of his food. The force expended by the horse in com-minuting his food—when it is composed of hay, straw and oats—may be set down as at least equal to the power he expends in one hour and a half of work, such, for example, as plowing. The preparation of his food, by means of steam or water power, or even by animal motive power, would economise by at least one-half, the labor expended in its mastication; this would be equialent to half a day's work in every week-a clear gain to the animal's owner. It has been objected to the use of bruised oats, that they produce a laxative effect upon the animals, but this disadvantage may be easily obviated by the addition of cut straw to his food. - Scientific
