THE SEAT OF WAR.

Early's defeat in Shenandoah Valley by Sheridan, is a great triumph for the North, and fearfully disastrous for the South. It was an awful struggle, and considering the numbers engaged, the loss of life on both sides is horrible to contemplate. Early was evidently outgeneralled, for he was taken by surprise and then he was largely outnumbered. His men fought desperately, but were compelled to yield to a superior force, and the result was overwhelming defeat, followed up on the part of Sheridan with a most destructive pursuit. Sheridan claims over 7000 prisoners, among them 150 commissioned officers. The Federals acknowledge a loss of 4000 men in the en-

The Tribune gives the following account of this bloody affair, headed SHERIDAN'S PURSUIT.

Official dispatches and our special dispatches bring news from Sheridan down to yesterday. The rebels made some sort of a stand shortly beyond Strasburg, but seem to have been driven from their position, or at any rate were dislodged from the crest of a hill which was a strong part of their line. Cavalry meanwhile are pressing upon their flank and rear, and their magazines at Woodstock are exposed to capture if Early still attempts to hold Strasburg. Dashing Phil. Sheridan is not the man to give a moment's rest to the flying army he has once beaten, and we rest content in the belief that he will press Early to the utmost.

The prisoners already taken are computed at not less than 7,200, and the total loss to the enemy is one-third of their whole army. They lost nine generals-three killed, six wounded. Particulars will be found in our special despatches. Altogether, no victory in the war surpasses the present in completeness, and considering the number engaged, none surpasses it in importance and probable results. For we believe that Sheridan means now to make clean work of the Shenandoah Valley. Early's is surely one of the worst beaten armies that the rebellion has yet seen, and cannot possibly be equal to the task of holding the Shenandoah against the impetuous advance of its victorious adversary. Indeed its only hope of delaying its own retreat is by seizing the gaps and passes on the East, but we already have news that Sheridan's cavalry are dashing down Luray Valley east of the isolated mountain ridge that reaches from Strasburg to Harrisburg, and we may readily infer that this flanking force will cross the Shenandoah river by the Laury bridge, and hold the road which through the Laury gap debouches upon Newmarket. And if that position is once turned there is nothing left to the rebels this side of the broken country to the south-east of Harrisburg, the country which has already witnessed the battles of Port Republic, Cross keys and of Piedmont. It is there, if anywhere, that Early will make a fight for the possession of Stauntom and especially for the mountain gaps and the roads which lead to Gordonsville, Charlottesville and Lynchburg. Already, therefore, has begun the struggle for the line of retreat and of supply, which is the last but one remaining to the army defending Richmond.

ATLANTA, Sept. 25 .- To the Louisville Agent of the New York Associated Press: Your press despatches of the 21st, embrace one from Macon of the 14th, approunding the arrival of the first train of refugees from Atlanta with this addition, "that they were robbed of every thing before being sent into the rebel lines." Of course that is false, and it is idle to correct it so far as the rebels are concerned, for they proposed it as a falschood to create a mischievous public opinion.

The truth is, that during the truce 446 families were moved South, making 705 adults, 860 children, and 479 servants, with 1651 pounds of furniture and household goods on the average to each family, of which we have a perfect recollection by name and article. Richmond papers contain very little news. They admit their defeat in the Valley and give their loss at 2500, about 500 of whom are prisoners. Rhodes's Division lost 1000 men. They put our loss at from 6000 to 8000. Generals Rhodes and Goodwin were killed, and Gen. Fitz Lee, and Col. Patton wounded. Gen. York lost an arm. Gen. Early was intrenched at Fisher's Hill, 22 miles south of Winchester.
