Their force was then so large that Gen. Hunter ordered a retreat. The rebels pursued, and a series of engagements were fought, in which our loss was at least eight thousand in killed, wounded and missing. On the retreat it is charged that Gen. Hunter filled the ambulances with negroes, to the neglect of the wounded white soldiers. It is also said that Gen. Crook has preferred charges against Gen. Hunter for incapacity and cruel treatment of his men. As an instance, it is charged, (we hope entirely untrue, for it is almost incredible), that Gen Hunter cow-hided a man personally for ordering a negro to get off a horse to give place to a wounded soldier. At Cannellton, the head of navigation on the Kanawha, 8,000 wound-ed were placed on barges and towed down the river. The sufferings on the retreat were terrible, and a half dozen soldiers died per hour during the last two days from starvation, fatigue and exposure. The retreat was long, horrible, and disastrous in the ex-

MORGAN'S RAID.

[From the Bichmond Enquirer, June 2.]

Gen. Morgan has returned to Virginia, and we have learned from a gentleman who has just arrived from Saltville, the following facts respecting his raid, We need not enumerate the towns taken by Morgan, for a full account of his movements, gleaned from Northern papers, has been published already. The fruits are these; Twenty-one hundred men carried into Kentucky upwards of eighteen hundred brought back. Seven hundred dismounted men procured good horses. Twenty-seven hundred Yankees were captured and paroled, amongst them Gen. Hobson, the man who captured Morgan in Ohio. Hobson was sent in company with one of Morgan's Majors, to Cincinnati, to negotiate the exchange of 700 of Mor-gan's men now in captivity. In the event of his failure to accomplish a favourable result, he has to come within our lines and surrender himself up to Morgan. Such are some of the substantial fruits of Morgan's work in Kentucky, in which his destruction of Yankee property is not included.
