ENGLISH AND FOREIGN.

By the Canada at Halifax, March 3. In the House of Lords, on the 16th ult., Earl Russell referring to the escape of the Alubama from Liverpool, said :-

I consider that having passed a law to prevent the enfistment of Her Majesty's subjects in the service of a foreign power, to prevent the fitting out or equipping, within Her Majesty's dominions, of vessels for warlike purposes without Her Majesty's sanction—I say that, having passed such a law in the year 1819, it is a scandal and a reproach that one of the beiligerents in this American contest has been enabled, at the order of the Confederate Government, to fit out a vessel at Liverpool in such a way that she was capable of being made a vessel of war: that, after ng to another port in Her Mujesty's dominions to going to another port in Her Majesty's dominions to ship a portion of her crew, she proceeded to a port in neutral territory, and there completed her crew and equipment of a vessel of war, so that she has since been able to capture and destroy innocent merchant vessels belonging to the other belligerent. (Hear.) Having been thus equipped by an evasion of the law, I say it is a scandal to our law that we should not be able to prevent such beligerent operations. (Hear hear).
