THE SEAT OF WAR. FROM PETERSBURG.

NEW YORK, Sept. 18.—The Herald's Army of the Potomac correspondent, writing under date of the 15th says:—" Information having been received that the enemy were moving quite a large body of troops on the left of Gen. Warren's corps, a force was sent out to ascertain the truth of the rumor. After pro- can flag. ling a short distance toward Petersburg the pickets of the enemy were met and driven in for a mile or more, when the command returned and moved

in an opposite direction.

After going a mile beyond our infantry pickets the enemy were discovered with the road strongly barricaded and a swamp on either side. A squadron of cavalry was dismounted who drove the rebels from dy for the most delicate female, or youngest child, their position in gallant style, and continued to drive them from one position to another for miles. No signs of large bodies of troops were discovered. Citizens reported 400 rebel cavalry encamped two miles in advance to guard the Boynton road, over which the rebels transport a large part of their sup-plies. On our return the rebels followed, driving back our pickets and compelling us to return and re establish our line. There are indications that the rebels are preparing to evacuate Petersburg. Large number of citizens have been leaving for the South

HEADQUARTERS ARMY OF THE POTOMAC, Sept. 16. -The flank attack by the rebel cavalry early yesterday morning was a most daring move and seems to have been partially successful. The attacking force consisted of three brigades of cavalry, with eight pieces of artillery. The main body reached the vicinity of the cattle herd on Buffin's farm, near Coggin's Point, just before daylight, while the remainder engaged our cavalry pickets along the entire line from Reams' Station, capturing some and driving others back. This was done to cover the operations of the main rebel column. The attack was made a short time before day-light, when the guard men were mostly abed. Two hundred prisoners are reported to have been captured, mostly of the 13th Penn. cavalry. The 1st District of Columbia cavalry, on duty near by, soon attacked the rebels, but they were in such strong force that our men had to fall back, suffering

a loss of 250. It is said that Gen. Gregg's division of cavalry, supported by the 2d Corps, went in pur-suit of the raiders, but it is believed they had too much the start and must have got off with the greater part of the plunder. In addition to our loss in cattle, which will reach 2500 heads, the rebels captured several teams, with a gang of ten men, who were engaged in constructing a telegraph line in that direction. A rumor reached camp this morning that the cattle had all been recaptured, but I cannot trace it to any reliable source.
