It is expected that Mr. Seward, Secretary of State, Mr. Fessenden, Secretary of the Treasury, and other members of the Cabinet, Gen. Delafield, Chief Engineer, Professor Bachie, of the Coast Survey, and other leading members of Congress will join the excursion. The Committee will extend their explorations to the Northwestern frontier up the St. John River to Madawaska, thence to the River Du Loupe, round by Gaspe and Gulf of St. Lawrence to Shediac, returning by way of St. John. Invita-tions have been extended by Governor Cony to the President to visit Maine during the summer."
