The Confederation of the British Provinces. It seems to us quite time that the growing Provinces of British America should aspire after a national character. It is estimated that in point of territorial extent these Colonies are quite equal to the whole extent of the United States. The Toronto Leader puts it down in round numbers at 2,933,078 English square miles. This surely is ample space for a large empire extending from the Atlantic to the Pacific. Between these two great oceans there is still uninhabited British territory more than a thousand miles in extent. For some time to come a confederation could not be expected to embrace more than the Provinces on the Atlantic side, but even then it would be larger than France, Italy, Portugal and Greece united, The people inhabiting this extensive territory, in point of wealth, intelligence, virtue, and all the other elements of self government, compare favorably with any po-pulation of equal extent upon the face of the earth. Why then should they not look forward to national independence? The first step toward such a condition is a harmonious confederation of the whole. Such a combination of all the material and mental resources of this vast territory would challenge the respect of the world, and stamp upon the provincialists a national importance to which they can never attain in their present isolated and separate condition. Let our most enlightened statesmen give up their little petty local squabbles, and grapple with this great question. Here is ample scope for the fullest exercise of their most enlarged capacities. Let the matter be fully discussed in Legislative halls, upon political platforms, through the press, and in all proper ways until the people shall see it in its true light and be prepared for action. The meetings which will shortly take place between the leading politicians of the several Provinces will, we hope, be one step in advance

The Yarmouth Herald of the 28th ult. says: The present summer has been remarkable for the absence of fog in this quarter. Not a foggy day has there been during the last two months, the usual fog period. We doubt if the "oldest inhabitant" can mber another summer so uniformly clear and only above the average in quantity, but of a superior quality that greatly enhances its value.

The Free Press, Bridgetown, speaking of the fires raging in different sections of the country, remarks: The mail-carrier, on the line from Annapolis to The mail-carrier, on the line from Annapolis to Liverpool, experienced great danger and difficulty in coming through the woods. been buried, with 1,000 more to inter. THE INVASION OF PENNSYLVANIA by the Confeder ates has resulted in great destruction of Federal pro-perty. Chambersburg, a town of considerable note, has been laid in ruins by the invading force. Its destruction is thus described by the Boston Post:

HARRISBURG, PA., July 31.—Gen, McCausland was in command of the rebel troops when they burned Chambersburg. He made proclamation demanding \$100,000 in gold. It was, of course, impossible to comply. An order was issued to fire the Courthouse, Town Hall and bank buildings. A strong breeze communicated the flames to the surrounding hoildings.

Parties of soldiers having sacked the several drug and chemical stores, manufactured turpentine balls which they threw in all directions, creating as many different flames which soon united in one grand con-flagration. Speedily the scene became appalling by the crackling and roaring of the flames and shricks of terrified women. Panic-stricken and suffering children, with the pitiful appeals of the old and help-less, formed an indescribable scene of horror. Two hundred and sixty-five of the most valuable and ele-

ant public and private dwellings were destroyed. The town was fired at about 11 o'clock in the forenoon. The rebels remained just long enough to see the flames get under proper headway, when an alarm was given that Averill was approaching the town. Instantly every freebooter was in his saddle and hurriedly took the St. Thomas road, with Averill in pursuit.

No intelligence has reached Harrisburg concerning the direct effect of Averill's attack, but it is believed that he succeeded in punishing McCauseland severely. A train heavily laden with commissary stores was despatched from this city this morning to Chambers-burg to relieve the present wants of homeless women and children, who now crowd the surrounding fields

and woods.

Many residences of prominent citizens in the outskirts of the town were burned. Among others was that of Colonel McClure, with his stables and outhouses.

AT PETERSBURG
the recent fighting has been of the most fearful char-

cter the seige of General Grant opened in earnest on Saturday morning last, and at daylight one of the principal rebel batteries was blown to atoms by the springing of a mine, prepared under the direction of Grant. . A despatch published in the Boston Post of Monday says :- lo and hingam I deeld

Headquarters Army of the Potomac, July 80-10 A. M. "The great event so long anticipated, namely, the explosion of the mine under the rebel fort in front of the 9th army corps, came off this morning at 40 minutes past 4 o'clock. Picket firing was kept up all night, and, in fact at the time the match was applied, the skirmishers were still engaged on both sides. Volumes of dirt were thrown up, rising over 800 feet in the air, resembling an immense fountain of earth more than anything else. The 9th army corps at once charged the works, driving the rebels to their second line of intrenchments and taking a number of prisoners, some of whom were dug out of the dirt badly bruised. These rebel prisoners state that only about a dozen of their regiment—a South Carolina one-now remains. As soon as the explosion took place, 120 guns immediately opened on our front, while musketry blazed in one continuous line of fire along the front of the 9th and 5th corps. The scene will long be remembered by those who witnessed it. The smoke from the guns soon obscured the view, and the first particulars of our success were gleaned from those who came in with the prisoners. Prisoners say we completely surprised those in their front, they being mostly asleep at the time. The prisoners also state that there were 4 guns in the fertifications, which, of course, were buried far out of sight. One of the prisoners stated that they were buisy mining under our works, and that in two days mrre they would have been ready to blow them up, out we got the start of them. a ditiv notionano

Headquarters Army of the Potomac, July 30 P. M. Report just in say that we have possession of the entire first line of the rebel works with large numbers of prisoners. Our losses in the charge were severe, as our men had to cross an open field to reach the rebels. The troops engaged were the 5th corps with the 18th supporting them, the 2d and 5th being held in reserve. Firing is still going on with great fury, Gens. Grant and Meade, with the corps Gens. are at the front watching the progress of affairs."

But strange to say this glorious victory proclaimed with such an air of triumph in the issue turns out a defeat. The despatch of Monday says "The assault on Petersburg failed: loss on both sides heavy." Very short, but awfully significant. Tuesday's despatch confirms the above. It says:---

Later advices from before Petersburg state that we were unable to hold all the ground gained in the assault on Saturday, it being mostly commanded by an inner line, and that the works taken by our forces were recaptured by the enemy. We captured 500 prisoners in the assault. Loss on both sides probably from 4,000 to 5,000. The colored regiments engaged

from 4,000 to 5,000. The colored regiments engaged lost heavily, especially in white officers. Gen. Burnside, who commanded them, was slightly wounded. Newspaper accounts in describing the assault show it to have been extremely bloody, and resulting in a serious reverse to the Federals. On Sunday morning, the ground on the front of our lines was literally covered with dead and wounded, festering in the hot sun, who could not be removed, the rebels' guns covering the entire space. Two regiments under Gen. Bartlett, who stormed one of the strongest rebel defences, held it six hours, and then were obliged to surrender. The Times correspondent says, large military operations in Virginia will be suspended for the present.
