The town of Belfast has been the theatre of civil war. The demonstration of the Orangemen, of burn-ing the effigy of O'Connell by way of retaliation for the inauguration on the same day of his statue in ing. He is in excellent health and spirits, and is Dublin, led to the rousing of angry passions on both better prepared than ever to engage heart and soul sides, which culminated on Saturday in an open riot and faction fight ; and from that day till Wednesday, it may be said that the war of race and religion was fought out in the streets of that wealthy, populous, and thriving city; with what terror to the peaceable inhabitants, with what less of property, and, still more lamentable, of life may be imagined. The Roman Catholic faction consisted for the most part, of navvies; The Orangemen of the ship-carpenters of the town ; and on more than one occasion the two partis met in hostile array, though never without the sturdy Orangemen scattering their opponents like The old spirit of Protestant ascendancy seemchaff. ed fully roused, and the Roman Catholics had no more chance than negro troops have in encountering a Southern brigade. But the greater part of the mischief was done by detached bands from both sides – or rather groups of scoundrels, filled with lust of mischief or plunder – who went about break-ing windows, wrecking houses, and despoiling goods in the name of their respective factions. The civil force was powerless to quell the fury of the rioters, and the central government was compelled to occupy the town with about 2,000 troops and policemen, and even they had a difficulty in restraining the fierce passions that had been excited. The importance of Atlanta as a strategical point is not easily over-estimated. Three main railroads diverge from it : the road to Chattanooga, on the north ; the Georgia road, running east to Chasleston ; and the road to the south, which forks into that leading to Montgomery and Pensacola, through Macon to Savanah. The city contained about twenty thousand inhabitants, five thousand of which were rebel refugees and officials, who had come bither since the war began.

nadian government steamer arrived at Charlottetown, having on board Messrs. Cartier, Brown, McDonald, Galt, McDongal. Campbell, McGee and Langeirn, their purpose being to invite the consideration of the convention to the possibility of a more extensive

The Convention was summoned to consider only a mion of the three maritime provinces, but the proposal of the Canadian government is that the whole of British North America, from Halifax to the Rocky Mountains, shall be united under one Federal govern-

ment and legislature. The Canadian delegation had no official standing in the Convention, Canada having no interest in the special question for which the Convention was sum-moned.

moned. The Canadian Deputies were, however, soon after their arrival, invited to meet the convention and pre-sent their views. They have accordingly been pre-sent at several meetings, and it is understood that the whole subject of a larger confederation has been fully discussed. The meetings have, however, been all held with closed doors, and the proceedings have not

transpired. The delegates meanwhile are enjoying the hospita-lities of the good people of Charlottetown. "Howard found the enemy in force at Jonesborough

and entrenched his troops, the salient within half a mile of the railroad. The enemy attacked him at 8 p. m. and was easily repulsed, leaving his dead and wounded. Finding strong opposition on the road, I advanced the left and centre rapidly to the railroad, made a good lodgment and broke it all the way from Rough and Ready down to Howard's left near Jonesborough, and by the same movement I interposed my whole army between Atlanta and the part of the enemy entrenched around Jonesborough. "We made a general attack on the enemy at Jones-

borough on the 1st of September, the 14th corps, Gen. Jeff. C. Davis, carrying the works handsomely with ten guns and about a thousand prisoners. In the night the enemy retreated south and we have fol-lowed him to another of his hastily constructed lines

near Lovejoy station. "Hood, at Atlanta, finding me on his road—the only one that could supply him—and between him and a considerable part of his army, blew up his ma-gazines in Atlanta and left in the night time, when the 20th corps, Gen. Slocum, took possession of the place. So Atlanta is ours and fairly won.

"Since the 5th of May we have been in one con-stant battle or skirmish, and need rest. "Our losses will not exceed 1200, and we have
