COLONIAL.

THE CONFEDERATION. The union of the maritime British Provinces with Canada is now a fixed fact, so far as the Representatives of these Colonies, in their late Conference at Quebec could so ordain. Whatever might have been the difference of opinion on the important questions at issue at the first meeting, it appears as the discussions, explanations, and compromises went forward from day to day, they all vanished into the air, and the final decisions on principles and details were unanimous. We are to have on this (Thursday) evening full explanations, at the Mechanics' Institute, by the Hon. Messrs. Gray and Tilley, of the whole matter. The former defining the Confederative Constitution, as agreed upon by the delegates, and the latter total loss estimated at two hundred million francs. presenting the financial aspect of the case. THE GOVERNMENT. - This is to consist of a Governor General, appointed by the Crown, as a connecting link between the Mother country and her new Colonial empire; of a Legislative Council, appointed by the Government in power, in such a way as to secure equality in the several constituent parts. and a House of Assembly made up of representatives chosen by the people themselves, the number of whom for each Province being defined by population. There will also be an Executive Council, composed of the leaders of the party in power, and subject to the will of the people as expressed through the representatives of the Lower Branch. This programme gives us a complete system of administration, extending from the will of the Crown to the will of the people, and calculated to preserve the rightful authority of the former, and the just liberties of the latter. The influence of the Crown is felt through the Governor General, and the power of the people acts through the representative branch upon the Executive Council which, after all, holds the reins of Government, and guides the ship of State. THE CONFEDERATIVE GOVERNMENT will have full charge of all questions of commerce, coinage, currency, navigation, fisheries, defences, military and naval establishments, and of war and peace, &c. &c. All the judges of the different courts, as also the Governors of the respective Provinces, will be appointed by the general government. These Lieutenant Governors will be advised by the heads of departments, who in turn are subject to the voice of the people. All questions of a general nature are to be decided by the Confederative government, and matters purely local, such as the control of municipal institutions, of private companies, of education, roads and bridges, and charitable institutions, &c., to be under the management of the local governments.

-----ENGLISH AND FOREIGN.

ARRIVAL OF THE "NOVA SCOTIAN." St. John's, N. F., Nov. 12th, 1864.

Nova Scotian arrived at noon on Saturday. Jura ran aground at Crosby Point, at the entrance of the Mersey, about ten o'clock on the morning of the 3rd, at high water. As the tide receded she was left dry, and parted in the middle. Mails and passengera sately landed. It was calm, but hazy at the time, and the pilot mistook lights. Efforts are to be made to float the ship in two pieces and tow her to the dock, only about six miles distance. She was uninsured.

The London Morning Herald editorially denounces capture of the Florida indignantly. The *Times* says, her capture in the harbor of a friendly State was simply an act of piracy. When within neutral port, she should have been free from molestation. The Herald says, if the Washington Government does not release the prize, all maritime powers have a right to interfere.

One hundred and fifty were driven from their moorings, stranded and damaged. It is believed that greater portion of their cargoes will be saved. There was no serious loss of European lives. There was much excitement at Lloyd's in consequence of the heavy losses. The American ships Loochow and Signapore were totally wrecked, the Drigo almost wrecked, the Red Rose, Southampton, Richard Busteed, Hindoostan, Western Star, Surprise, Southern Cross, Eastern Belle, Continental, Southern Belle, Leonide and Harry Warren were more or less damaged. The American ship Mandarin was lost off Batavia.

UNITED STATES.

THE PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION, as was expected, has resulted favorably for the party in power. Mr. Lincoln has received a majority in all the States except three or four of the border States. In some, the majority was small ; in others, very large. Massachusetts cast the largest majority vote. It is thought that the Government has secured a two-third vote in the Senate, which will enable it so to change the Constitution as to shut out Slavery forever. This war is obviously tending to emancipation. The North early adopted anti-slavery as a war measure, and the South, if they continue the war, must ultimately do the same. The whole currant is running in that direction now. The moment they arm 250,000 slaves to fight the North, as they are talking of doing, they must give them their freedom. Jehovah has heard the groanings of his people in bondage, and has come forth in a mysterious way to work out their deliverance. But freedom, as a war measure, is a costly affair for all concerned. Better, one would think, to have purchased emancipation at an expense of \$20,000 fer every slave in the Union, than to have had this terrible baptism of blood.

Lincoln majorities, estimated by careful observers from dispatches received, are : Maine, sixteen thousand. New Hampshire, three thousand. Vermont, twelve thousand. Massachusetts, seventy thousand. Rhode Island, five thousand. Connecticut, fifteen hundred. New York, thirty-two thousand. Pennsylvania, twelve thousand five hundred. Ohio, sixty thousand. Indiana, twenty-eight thousand. Illinois, sixteen thousand. Michigan, ten thousand. Minnesota, two thousand. Maryland, eleven thousand. It is also believed that Lincoln has received ma-

orities in West Virginia, Wisconsin, Iowa, Kensas and Novado. The doubtful States are Missouri, California, and

Oregon, but special despatches from Missouri assert that Lincoln has carried that State.

Little Mac has probably carried Delaware, New Jersey and Kentucky, but the Union cause has received large votes in those States.

Maryland did nobly. In the Woodsborough district of Frederick county, the rebels took possession of the polls, and would receive none but McClellan votes, but a squad of Union cavalry routed them. The Pennsylvania soldiers in theDistrict of Colum-

bia gave a Union majority of 1104. The Iowa soldiers gava a majority of 47. Wiscon-sin soldiers a majority of 596. Five companies of the

1st New Hampshire Heavy Artillery, stationed in the defenses of Washingion, gave 803 for Lincoln, 138 for McClellan.

BOSTON, Nov. 14.

The captured rebel steamer Florida has arrived at Fortress Monroe.

A smart Cavalry fight took place on Saturday, near Winchester, in which the rebels were defeated, sing two guns and 150 prisoners.

The Rebel Secretary of War in his report reviews the campaign of 1864, and claims a succession of victories. He demands a more vigorous conscription, favors arming the Slaves, but does not perceive any mmediate necessity for the measure.

Rumored that Secretary Stanton will be made Chief Justice of Supreme Court, and Joseph Holt, of Kentucky, Secretary of War.

Losses by the hurricane at Calcutta are estimated at forty million dollars ; nineteen British ships were totally wrecked and 85 badly damaged. Gold 240.
