"GENERAL—Five generals and forty-five field offi-cers of the United States Army—all of them prison-ers of war - have been sent to this city for safe keep-ing. To this notice Gen. Foster replies :

"I must protest against your action in thus placing defenceless prisoners of war in a position exposed to constant bombardment. It is an indefensible act of cruelty, and can be designed only to prevent a continuance of our fire upon Charleston. That city is a depot for military supplies. It contains not merely arsenals, but also foundries and factories for the manufacture of munitions of war. In its shipyards several armed iron-clads have been already completed, while others are still upon stocks in course of con-struction. Its warves and the banks of the river on struction. Its warves and the banks of the river on both sides of the city are lined with batteries. To destroy these means of continuing the war is, there-fore, our object and duty. You seek to defeat this effort, and by means not known to honorable warfare, but by placing unarmed and helpless prisoners under

On the matter being represented to the Govern at Washington, an order was made directing the same number of Confederate officers to be sent to General Foster, and exposed in the same way to the fire of the Confederate batteries. A Boston paper says :

the Confederate batteries. A Boston paper says: "We suppose that no principle of the laws of civ-lized wafare is better known, than that wanton and needless injury to an enemy is not justifiable. The burning of Washington by the British in the war of 1812 has always been reprobated by public senti-ment. In the case of Charleston, we do not see how mere casual firing on it can be justified. No good comes from it to the attacking party, and the injury inflicted ainks from the standard of that which is ne-cessary in order to gain an end, down to that of pri-vate mischief, harming only the individual who hap-pens to suffer in person or property by a stray ball. If Charleston were bombarded with the intention and expectation of taking it by this means, in co-operation with other methods, all would be very well. But this is not the case. The Confederates under-stand this doctrine of war perfectly well, and have determined upon a sort of defensive process which has been the subject of severe animadversion in the radical papers.
