MOBILE, Aug. 9.-Hon. S. E. Mallory, Secretary of the Navy : The enemy steamed in through the main entrance with four monitors and about sixteen heavy vessels of war. The Teconseh, Commander T. M. Craven, was sunk with nearly all her crew, and also another gunboat, the Phillippi, which I subse-quently burned. The Richmond, Hartford and srooklyn, in line of battle, followed by the remainder of the fleet, pushed by Fort Morgan under full headway, when they were encountered by the Tennessee, Morgan, Gaines, and Selma. The Tennessee and the other vessels steamed in close range of the advancing force, and poured a heavy fire into the leading ships. After a desperate struggle between the fleets, the Gaines retired to Fort Morgan in a sinking condition; the Selma was cut off and sorrendered, and the Morgan escaped to Fort Morgan. The Tennessee, so far uninjured, steamed towards the whole fleet, and after ap obstinate fight surrendered. Her rudder was dis-abled, her smoke stack carried away, and, as we sup-pose, her crew in an exhausted and smothered condition. On the Tennessee Admiral Buchanan was severely wounded by a splinter in his leg. Two were killed and several wounded among her crew. On the Gaines two were killed and two wounded. . On the Morgan one was wounded. On the Selma eight were killed, including her Executive officer, and seven wounded. The enemy suffered severely, and requested permission to bury his dead. G. W. What we feared when Sherman had gone so far from his base (with a questionable line of conviction to say the least) we fear now. We apprehend that Kirby Smith would strike his connections between Chattanooga and the Tennessee River. The unfortunate result of McCook's and Sherman's raid has placed the opportunity with Hood. We have underrated Hood, or the power that Hood represents. The Mobile affair, we fear, will not be as great an advantage to us as the public expect. We have seized upon Mobile forts and left other important points unguarded. We have said that the rebels have recruited largely in the territory West of the Mississippi River. The troops from that seccion are fresh, and, as has been often proved, they fight. Once across the river, from what

Then why shall it be long witheld ? Let as know, so soon as may be, the most that the Rebel Chiefs will do to secure Peace ; let us next ascertain what is the " ultimatum " on our side; and, if the difference between these is material, let us fight all the harder till one side or the other is ready to make the needful concession. It is high time matters were coming to a point.

We have no sympathy with the shuddering dread that our Government may, by listening to proposi-tions from the Rebels, virtually acknowledge their independence. Etiquette is the disease of little minds ; great souls are never troubled by it. When McClel an, at the head of 150,000 brave soldiers, lay four months cooped up and virtually besieged in Wash-ington and its environs by less than 50,000 Rebels, we practically acknowledge their independence infi-nitely more than we should by receiving their Commissioners and listening to their propositions. If any body argues that we acknowledge them by treating with them, we may simply leave such sophistry to be answered by Grant, Sherman, and Farragut, who appear to have considerable skill in that sort of logic.
