# There is nothing new from Grant's army in morn-

ing papers. The *Herald's* Harper's Ferry dispatch of the 19th states that an army is so disposed as to cover all the fords on the Upper Potomac, also Snicker's, Ashby's and Manasses Gaps. Reconnoisances are now being made which will develope the strength of the rebel army and guide our future movements.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 20.-Rumors here state that General Sheridan has been defeated and retired to Harper's Ferry; also that his wagon train crossed the Potomac last night, and is reported to be at Hagerstown this morning, safe. New York, Aug. 20.—The World's dispatch from

Charlestown, Va., Aug. 18, says that General Sheri-dan has fallen back to Berrysville from Strasburg. This retrograde movement was in consequence of the rapid advance of Early, reinforced by part of Longstreet's corps, also of movements of the enemy which threatened to envelope or at least flank him by the way of the Gaps. General Sheridan is now on the defensive, and it is understood is in a strong position. In executing this retrograde movement a portion of his command acting as rear guard were overtaken near Winchester, by the advance of the enemy, un-der Breckenridge, and overpowered, being completely surrounded and nearly all captured. The prospects of a battle depend upon the energy of Early's advance,

Sheridan is to-day encamped between Clifton and Charlestown. I have heard the rebel force estimated at 40,000 infantry and 15,000 cavalry.

OPERATIONS AT ATLANTA.

Several Houses in the Clty struck by our Shot and Shell.

NEW YORK, August 20. Rebel despatches of the 12th, 13th, and 15th, report a number of houses struck by our shot and shell; that Sherman extended his lines on the 12th, but withdrew to his original position again ; that the attack on their centre pickets on the 14th were repulsed; that Federal cavalry dashed into Decatur on the evening of the 15th, mov-in the direction of Cobb's mill, indicating another movement against the rebel right, and that lively skirmishing was going on in the rebel centre on the evening of the 15th. The rebel papers supress gratification at the pros-

pect of the exchange of prisoners.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Friday, Aug. 16-12.20 P. M. The Richmond Sentinel contains the following dis-

patch, dated Mobile, Aug. 15 :---

This evening two monitors and five gun-boats crossed Dog River Bar, and coming up to within two miles of the obstructions opened fire for three hours on our batteries and gunboats, doing no damage. One of our gunboats replied handsomely. Our batteries were silent. At sunset the enemy hauled off.

ADMIRAL FARRAGUT ISSUES ORDERS FOR THE ATTACK ON FORT MORGAN.

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 12, via CAIRO, Aug, 18.

The steamer Kate Dale, from Fort Gaines harbor yesterday morning, arrived here last night. Admiral Farragut had prepared his fleet for action and ordered the attack to commence at Fort Morgan

at eight o'clock yesterday morning. It was to receive an enfilading fire from the fleet and land force. Its rear is said to have resisted the attack, wherever

there was a foot of ground to stand upon. The rebels had destroyed all the outbuildings of the Fort and had also burned their only vessels lying under its guns.

Everything about the fort indicated a determination on the part of the rebels to contest the battle to the last.

The demand of Farragut on Tuesday last for the surrender of the fort was refused by the rebel com-mander, who replied that he had six months provi sions, plenty of lighting men, and would resist to the last moment

Before this Gen. Graner's force in the rear had cut off all the communications of the fort.

The ram Tennessee was in the attack. The Hartford was badly injured. We hold all the channels to the bay.

people do, and your Congress has recently said that you do. We have come to ask how it can be brought about. \* In a very simple way. Withdraw your armies from our territory, and peace will come of itself. We do not seek to subjugate you. We are not waging an offensive war, except so far as it is offensive-defensive -that is, so far as we are forced to invade you to prevent your invading us. Let us alone and peace

will come at once,' ' But we cannot let you alone so long as you repu-

diate the Union. That is the one thing the Northern People will not surrender.' I know. You would deny to us what you exact

for yourselves-the right of self-government.' 'No, Sir,' I remarked.-' We would deny you no

natural right; but we think Union essential to peace : and, Mr. Davis, could two people, with the same language, separated by only an imaginary line, live at peace with each other ? Would not disputes constantly arise, and cause almost constant war between them 1

" Undoubtedly-with this generation. You have sown such bitterness at the South, you have put such an ocean of blood between the two sections, that I despair of seeing any harmony in my time. Our children may forget this war, but we cannot? 'I think the bitterness you speak of, sir,' said the

Colonel, ' does not really exist. We must talk here as friends; our soldiers meet and fraternize with each other; and I feel sure that if the Union were restored, a more friendly feeling would arise between us than has ever existed. The war has made us know and respect each other better than before. This is the view of very many Southern men; I have had it from many of them-your leading citizens.'

'They are mistaken,' replied Mr. Davis. ' They do not understand Southern sentiment. How can we feel anything but bitterness towards men who deny us our rights ? If you enter my house and drive me out of it, am I not your natural enemy ?

\* You put the case too strongly. But we cannot fight forever ; the war must end at some time ; we must finally agree upon something; can we not agree now and stop this frightful carnage? We are both Christian men, Mr. Davis. Can you, as a Christian man, leave untried any means that may ead to peace ?

'No. I cannot. I desire peace as much as you do. I deplore bloodshed as much as you do; but I feel that not one drop of the blood shed in this war is on my hands; and I look up to my God and say this. I tried all in my power to avert this war. I saw it coming, and for twelve years I worked night and day to prevent it, but I could not. The North was mad and blind; it would not let us govern ourselves; and so the war came, and now it must go on till the last men of this generation falls in his tracks, and his children seize his musket and fight his battles, uness you acknowledge our right to self-government. We are not fighting for Slavery. We are fighting for independence, and that or extermination we will have.

'And there are at least four and a half millions of us left, so you see you have a work before you,' said Mr. Benjamin, with a decided sneer.

"We have no wish to exterminate you," answered the Colonel. "I believe what I have said-that there is no bitterness between the Northern and Southern people. The North, I know, loves the South. When peace comes, it will pour money and means into your hands to repair the waste caused by the war, and it would now welcome you back and forgive you all the loss and bloodshed you have caused. But we must crush your armies and exterminate your Goverhment. And is not that already nearly done? You are wholly without money and at the end of your resources. Grant has shut you up in Rich-mond. Sherman is before Atlanta. Had you not, then, better accept honorable terms while you can retain your prestige and save the pride of the Southern people ? Mr. Davis smiled.

'I respect your earnestness, Colonel, but you do not seem to understand the situation. We are not exactly shut up in Riemand. If your papers tell the truth it is your capital that is in danger, not ours. Some weeks ago Grant crossed the Rapidan to whip Lee and take Richmond. Lee drove him in the firs battle, and then Grant executed what your people call a 'brilliant flank movement,' and fought Lée again. Lee drove him a second time, and then Grant made another flank movement; and so they kept on —Lee whipping and Grant flanking—until Grant got where he is now. And what is the net result? Grant has lost seventy-five or eighty thousand men -more than Lee had at the outset and is no nearer Richmond than at first; and Lee, whose front has never been broken, holds him completely in check, and has men enough to spare to invade Maryland and threaten Washington ! Sherman, to be sure, is before Atlanta; but suppose he is, and suppose he takes it? You know that the further he goes from his base of supplies the weaker he grows and the more disastrous defeat will be to him. And defeat may come. So, in a military view, I should certain ly say our position was better than yours. citizens are to be seen on the street. The sick and wounded from the hospitals have been removed to Harrisburg. WASHINGTON, Aug. 21, 1864.—On Thursday morn-ing last, 18th inst., General Warren, with the 5th ing last, 18th inst., General Warren, with the 5th Army Corps, took possession of the Weldon railroad on our left at Petersburg, drove the rebel pickets be-fore him, and commenced to intrench his position, with the view of protecting his men during several hard days' work in destroying the Weldon road. In doing so he met with very little opposition from the enemy, as Lee had been compelled to withdraw his troops to the north side of James River in order to encounter the operations of Gen. Grant at that point. As soon as the rebels discovered Gen. Warren's movements, a furious assault was made by them on onr lines at Deep Bottom, in which they were repulsed with great slaughter by Terry's coloured brigade. The enemy's loss will foot up one thousand. The loss of the coloured brigade is heavy. The line of opera-tions from Gen. Birny's headquarters to Gen. War-ren's on the left is now at least iwenty-five miles.
