In the prompt manner in which His Excellency the Lieut. commend itself to the United States Government; but whomsoever it may please or displease, must be to me, judicially, a matter of indifference. The only duty I have to discharge is to my Sovereign, to the people of this Province, and to my own conscience. That duty, is, faithfully, to the best of my humble abilities, impartially to declare the law as I believe it to be, wholly regardless of consequences. "This I have honestly endeavored to do, and the result of my judgment is, that for the reasons set forth, the proceedings before me and the warrant of commitment returned to me by the Sheriff of the City and County of St. John, do not justify the de-tention in custody of the prisoners, whose imprison-ment I do therefore declare illegal ; and I do by this my order require the immediate discharge from prison my order require the immediate discharge from prison of the said David Collins, James McKinney, and Linus Seely, under the said warrant and com and as it spears to me that the Sheriff of the City and County of St. John, the keeper of the said Jail, acted upon the warrant of Commitment of the said H. T. Gilbert, according to the requirements of the same, without malice or evil intent, I do, by virtue of the power conferred on me by the Act of Assembly, exempt the said keeper of the said Jail from all civil suits which may be brought against him for or by reason of having acted upon the said warrant or


