The consequence was that those from the centre, rushing to the doors, came in mass upon those near the doorways while yet seated or kneeling on the floor. The latter were unable to rise in consequence, the former fell over them, the next flower garden. behind fell on these, and so on, until about the doors FURTHER ACCOUNT a wall of human bodies, entangled in one another's dresses, completely choked up every avenue of escape into the street. The fire meanwhile was progressing overhead as if through tinder. The paraphene lamps fell from aloft, discharging their inflammable contents on the ill-fated victims, wrapping them in an instant in fiames. In a moment the gorgeous church was a sea of

flame. Michael Angelo's fearful picture of hell was there, but exceeded. Help was all but impossible; a Hercules might have strained his strength in vain to pull one from the serried mass of frenzied wretches, who, pried one above another, as they climbed over to reach the air, wildly fastened the grip of death, upon any one escaping, in order that they might be dragged out with them. Those who longed to save them were doomed to bear the most harrowing sight that ever seared human eyeballs-to see mothers, sisters, tender and timid women, dying that dreadful one yard of salvation, within one yard of men who would have given their lives over and over again for them. It was maddening—the screaming and wring-ing of hands for help as the remorseless flames came on; and then, while some already dead with fright were burned in ghastly indifference, others in their horrible agony-some in prayer, were tearing their hair and battering their faces. Women, seized in the embraces of the flames, were seen to undergo a transformation as though by an optical delusion — first dazzlingly bright, then horribly lean and shrunk up, then black statues, rigidly fixed in a writhing Within a few steps of the main door, fronting upon the plaza was a group of perhaps two hundred, from the white haired and venerable woman to the infant of tender years. On the right hand knelt a beau tiful girl of some seventeen years, as yet untouched by the eager flames that poured down from above, and by her side with her sister and mother, locked in each other's arms, within the reach of those without, who ever and anon dasked recklessly through the scorchever and anon dasked recklessly through the scorch-ing doorway and ineffectually grasped the clothing or limbs the nearest. Writhing with terror, the horri-ble group swayed to and fro, the weaker gradually sinking forward and falling, never to rise again, while the strong battled with desperate energy to reach the saving hands that struggled as desperately to reach them. But all was in vain, and in an awfully brief energy fine the weath of flows. brief space of time the wall of flame, became impass ble ; the entire floor of the church was a sea of fire, fed by the clothing of the victims and intensified by fed by the clothing of the victims and intensified by the dropping lamps. The struggle within must have been fearful, since those who were saved were dragged out completely naked, and many have since died. In a brief half hour after the breaking out of the fire the whole in-terior of the church was a lake of flame, rising far above the heads of the shrieking sufferers, while the hundreds of bodies massed immovably together burned like so many blocks of wood. urned like so many blocks of wood. burned like so many blocks of wood. Through the lurid flames arms could be seen ex-tended in supplication, mothers folding their daugh-ters to their burning breasts, and, while the hellish light painted up the distorted features, loud above the roar of the crackling rafters and rushing flames rese the commingled shricks of over two thousand victims. Strong, robust men were seen struggling to extri-cate themselves, but in vain; and all this within a few feet of hundred spectators! Trees in the plaza were cut down and thrust in over the burning heads, but it was too late. The smaller branches were but it was too late. FURTHER ACCOUNT OF THE CALAMITY AT SANTIAGO. Why the victims were not saved.

The Providence Journal publishes a letter received

by Mr. W. A. Pearce of Providence from his father, resident in Santiago, Chili, who witnessed the recent appalling catastrophe. It appears that the failure to rescue the unfortunate victims was owing to the idiotic police system of the Chilians. The writer says :

"I hear you asking, why were those sufferers not rescued? Yes, why were they not rescued? My heart sickens within me at the question. Those de termined, stupid ignoramuses of policemen ! Fifty foreigners, had they been allowed to work, and to work in their own way, could and would have rescued nearly or quite the whole mass. But no, as is always the case here on an alarm of fire, the police place a sentry on every avenue leading to the fire. They have, as you know, no fire engines except some two 18 K or three old wordon pumps. If sight my way past the police one entire square, by wresting guns and sabres from their hands, knocking them out of my way and being knocked in-return, until I was over-powered by numbers and compelled to retreat, and all within hearing of the most heart rending lamenta-tions that ever sounded on human ears. And nearly every foreigner fared similar to myself—was kep-back The police had full charge of the front of the church The police had full charge of the front of the church and in such force that the foreigners could do nothing there. The police rescued but a few. Axes and crowbars were not to be had until a fate hour. A single instance will suffice to show the stupidity o the police. An officer of the police set some hal dozen of his men to hew or batter down one of those hours down one of those large front doors with their old broad swords. The doors are made of two inch hard wood, double thick ness, and riveted through and through with iron rivets. You can judge the effect their old cutlasse made on the doors better than I can describe it. The scene at the church the following day was the most revolting, heart-distressing, that ever was wit nessed since the world was created. There were the nessed since the world was created. There were the poor unfortunate in all stages of consumption, the greater portion of them naked. But a few could be recognised by their surviving friends. The polic ordered on the peones, or laborers, to remove the dead. Those demons—worse than devils damned— commenced their work with as much hilarity as you ever saw school children on some pleasure excursion. The dead were pulled about and pulled apart as on The dead were pulled about and pulled apart as on would pull apart tangled brushwood. You could se two or more pences pulling on a limb of some on buried under the others, until the limb was pulle-from the body. Then they would have a peon rejoic and howl of exultation, and commence at another. The dead were actually separated with crowbars and pick. Limbs, head and fragments were shoveled int carts with no more feeling than Irish laborers would have in shoveling gravel into a railway car. Hund dreds of bodies, but partially burned, entirely naked were tumbled into open carts and packed up in the covering of a bundle of straw, or a bulrush, and hun-dreds of those heartless wretches commenting an joking on the scene, and all under the supervision of the police. I have seen within the past tan year the police. I have seen within the past ten year here among these people many things that were to me very unpleasant. But this is so horrifying to the soul that I cannot find language to express my disgust of them. ust of them. Twenty two hundred bodies have been counted or Twenty two hundred bodies have been counted of from the ruins, and it is supposed many were burne entirely up. The prevailing opinion is the number of lives lost will reach twenty five hundred. The count and names collected to date amount to som lifteen hundred. Many families have lost the entit female members—six, seven, eight and nine from ot family. All those that could not be recognized by their surviving friends are now buried in one grave of hole. A place twenty five yards square was exce-vated, and into this they were laid, or tumbled an aboveted.
