and Prussia have now stepped upon the stage of con-troveray, elbowing aside the minor German Powers. They have brought up a new issue—the demand that Denmark shall repudiate the constitution of Novem-ber last (formed under the late King and adopted by the present) which incorporates the duchy of Schleswig with the rest of the kingdom. The demand, with its penalty of an armed occupation of Schleswig, was at first submitted for endorsement to the German Diet at Frankfort, and was rejected by a vote of eleven against five. Thereupon Austria and Prussia resolved to disregard the vote, take the matter into their own hands and carry the demand directly to Denmark. They have done so, and received a refusal.

Denmark. They have done so, and received a refusal. Hence they are upon the point of occupying Schles wig with a heavy and probably irresistible force. It is alleged on the part of these Powers that the movement is a peaceful one, inasmuch as it prevents the occupation of Schleswig by the minor German troops. But why, it may be asked, is the one armed invasion any different from the other? The reply, is, that the November constitution is claimed, so far ce it schetes to Schleswig to be inconsistent with the as it relates to Schleswig, to be inconsistent with the treaty of 1852, which gave the crown of Denmark to the present King. Austria and Prussia signed this treaty and the minor German States did not; and hence, while the former may step in and occupy Schleswig under color of enforcing the observance of the treaty, the same act on the part of the other Ger-man Powers would be unwarranted and revolutionary. In fact, many believe that a general revolutionary purpose is at the bottom of the German excitement. and that the real aim of its instigators is not the re-covery of the two duchies for Prince Augustenburg, but a European war. Austria and Prussia seem to share this apprehension, and to believe that, by the course they have chosen, the can localize the dispute

course they have chosen, the can localize the dispute and also the war, if there should be one. The development of this new complication will be awaited with interest. So far from having elicited pacific results at the outset, Austria and Prussia have provoked a double disagreement, first with the rest of Germany, and secondly with Denmark. The Prince of Augustenburg now goes into the back-ground. Schleswig will be occupied by a powerful force, which it will be almost madness on the part of Descent to residt. force; which it will be almost madness on the part of Denmark to resist. Unless a collision is prematurely brought on, it may be hoped that this last step, being avowedly taken in the interest of the London Treaty of 1852, will result in calling a Congress of its signers, and thus working out a peaceful solution of the whole matter around tha council board.

The Edinburgh Scotchman, states that " the num The Edinburgh Scotchman, states that " the num-ber of steamers that have left the Clyde since the blockade of the Confederate ports were commenced is apwards of sixty, and their purchase price amounts in the aggregate to about £700,000. The selling and building of steamers for this trade has been perhaps building of steamers for this trade has been perhaps the most renumerative speculation during the past year. In many cases vessels were sold at a half more than their original cost. In 1861 and 1862 thirty steamers left the Clyde; of these six were paddle vessels in the river trade, five paddle and six screw vessels in the deep sea trade, and the remain-der were new. In 1863 twenty-eight steamers sailed, and of these eleven were river paddle-boats, one a paddle and one a screw in the deep sea trade. Seven were new paddle and eight new screw vessels. The total of their registered tonnage was 6,500 tons, and they were manned by about 800 hands. The havoc that has been made amongst them has been very great. Of the 80 that sailed previously to 1863, only four have escaped, the others being either burned, sunk, or captured; while of those that left last year, five have been captured, fifteen are still running, and the remainder are on their way out. During the present month three more steamers have left, and several are fitting out to follow. A few of the captured steamers made only one trip, while others made over a dozen ; and on the whole they have paid their owners very well, some of them being a source of great profit to all converned."

UNITED STATES.

The North and the South are both busy recruiting their armies, and skirmishing along the lines now

There is a report of a revolt of the garrison of Fort Morgan in Mobile Bay. They hoisted the stars and stripes and opened fire upon some rebel gunboats. and drove them off. But they were surprised during the night, and the whole force of the garrison were captured except four men, who escaped to the Federal lines bringing the information of the revolt. Seventy. of the revolters were to be shot.

The Confederates having found out what good soldiers the negroes make, are proposing to try them in their own armies on a large scale. A bill authorising the enlistment of free negroes and the impressment of slaves between the ages of 18 and 50, has been debated in the Confederate Congress. That result has not transpired.

REBEL PLANS.—The Washington correspondent of the Chicago Times (Copperhead) says "intelligent men from the South" declare that the Confederacy will have fully 500,000 effective troops in the field in the spring; that Gen. Johnston will have 150,000 of them to fight Grant, 150,000 more will invade the North, and the rest will defend Richmond, Charleston, &c.

Considerable disaffection is reported among the Reber armies at different points, especially at Chaftanooga and in texas.

Gen. Lee has issued a general order to his troops in reference to the reduction of their rations, appealing to their patriotism and asking them to endure for a little while till supplies get plenty.

Some of the Southern papers begin to show a more hopeful spirit. Others say the only hope of the Confederacy is to maintain defensive policy, and risk nothing. It is reported that the Confederates have possession of a point on the Mississippi at which they are sending arms and ammunition to their troops west of that river.

LATEST NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

Confederates have retreated from the vicinity of Newburn, finding its defences stronger than they expected. The late "reconnoisance" in front of the army of the Potomac, had for its object a sudden dash on Richmond to liberate Federal prisoners, but was frustrated by information given to the enemy by a deserter. The expedition went within twelve miles of Richmond causing great panic.

BANGOR, Feb. 10.

All quiet army Potomac since return of reconno sance. Number-prisoners taken in it does not exceed fifty.

Newbern despatch says large number deserters coming in. Reported Confederate Gen. Pickett with 15,000 men was confident of taking Newbern, but arrival reinforcements from Beaufort prevented his attack.
