THE SEAT OF WAR.

The following is the latest despatch from Mr. Stanton, the Secretary at War: WASHINGTON, May 28, 9 50, P. M.

To Major-Gen. Dix: An official despatch from Headquarters, Army of the Potomac, at Mongohick Church, ten miles from Hanovertown, dated yesterday 5 p. M., has been received. It states that our army was withdrawn to the north side of the North Anna, Thursday night, and moved towards Hanovertown, the place designated for crossing the Pamunkey River. At 9 o'clock yesterday morning (Friday), Gen. Sheridan, with the 1st and 2d divisions of cavalry, took possession of Hanover Ferry and Hanovertown, finding there only a rebel vidette. The first division of the 6th Corps arrived at 10 a. M., and now hold the place with a sufficient force of calvary, infantry, and artillery, to resent any attack likely to be made upon him. The remainder of the corps are passing forward with rapi-

dity. The weather is fine and perfect.

A later despatch dated 7 o'clock this morning, (Saturday) from Headquarters, Mongohick Church, has also been received. It reports that everything goes on finely. The weather is clear and cool. The troops came up rapidly and in great spirits, and the army will be beyond the Pamunky River by noon. Breckinridge is at Hanover Court House with a force variously estimated at from 8,000 to 10,000. Wickham's and Lomach's Brigade of Cavalry are also

The despatch further states that after seizing Hanover Ferry yesterday, Gen. Toabert captured 75 cavalry, including six officers, and that the rebel cavalry is exceedingly demoralized and flees before ours on

A despatch from Gen. Sherman May 28th, 6 a. m. dated near Dallas, reports that the enemy, discovering his move to turn Alatoona, moved to meet our orces at Dallas. Our columns met the enemy about one mile east of Pumpkin Vine Creek, and pushed them back about three miles to a point where the roads fork to Atlanta and Marietta. Here Johnston has chosen a strong line and made hasty but strong parapets of timber and earth. Gen. Sherman's right is at Dallas, and the centre about three miles north.

The country is densely wooded and brooken; no roads of any consequence. We have had many frequent encounters, but nothing decisive. No despatches from any other field of operations have been received to-day.

(Signed) E. M. STANTON Secretary of War. The Boston Courier of Monday last gives an account of the recent movement. It says :-

"The movement of Gen. Grant towards tide water which has been in progress since the earlier battles of the campaign, the telegraph informs us has gained its object by the arrival of the army at the Pamunkey river. Hanover town, in our possession, is on the Pamunkey, over which our troops were passing without resistance. The stream is navigable for boats of light draught almost to Hanover Court House, some eight or nine miles above the place of crossing; but the permanent base of the army must be at White House, not far from thirty miles below, by the river passage. Having thus entirely abandoned his original plan of operations, which was the direct route to Richmond, Gen. Grant finds himself, after a circuitous march, dreadful battles and an enormous loss of men, near the position of McClellan, upon his advance up the Peninsula, with comparatively slight engagements and trifling loss. In fact, Grant now rests upon precisely the same base of supplies held by McClellan, reached in the manner in which it has been accomplished, because the War Department would not consent to any apparent coin-cidence in the line of operations with those adopted by McClellan. At length, it comes to exactly the same thing, and at what a fearful sacrifice? On the 16th of May, 1862, McClellan's Headquarters were at White House; on the 27th the battle of Hanover Court House took place, and that of Fair Oaks on the 80th. We observe it stated that Breckinridge is at Hanover with a force variously estimated, and parently on Grant's flank. This is likely, since private advices report the greater part of Sigel's force as having passed through Alexandria and Occoquan, to join Grant some ten days ago."

"It must not be forgotten that we have entered on this campaign just as we have entered on all the others, without any reserve. Our whole army is in the field, actively engaged with the enemy, and we have no body of trained men to draw on to fill up the gaps made by battle or disease. As we have often said before, no nation in the world has ever carried on a war in this way before. It is in the highest degree reckless and wasteful, and exposes us, every time a battle is fought, to the most terrible risks; and we certainly should long ere this have paid the penalty of our rashness, but for the fact that the nature of the country renders all our actions inthe nature of the country renders all our actions in-
