I ran across a ploughed field about half a mile into some woods, where I caught a stray horse. How I ever got across that field without being hit, I cannot tell, but thanks to

Him who ruleth all, I did. Out of our gun detachment of ten, five were

wounded. Lient. Snow, commanding the battery, was wounded, and fell into the hands of the enemy. It is said that our loss is 5000, but it don't seem to me that it can be so much as that. 2500 I should say would be high. The rebels did fight like vengeance. You read in the papers that they are coming into our lines by regiments, and verily they did with a vengeance, sending messengers before them. They fought like tigers. They poured out in the face of a deadly fire of our artillery. The solid columns of their army marched right up into the very teeth of our guns. Our shot ploughed through them, our shells mowed them down, and our canister scattered, but on they come, they come. Hundreds of them must have been left on the field. Men could not fight better than they did. They drove away our infantry, they killed our horses, and to save ourselves we had to run.

I lost everything, thankful to escape whole, while so many fell wounded or killed. As I was running across the field mentioned above, the bullets were falling all round me, before, behind, and on both sides.

THE FORGED PROCLAMATION. - Tremendous excitement was occasioned in New York and Boston by the publication, in some of the dailies, of a bogus proclamation, signed by President Lincoln and Secretary Seward, announcing the virtual defeat of Grant's army, and a call by the President for 400,800 additional men. The New York Tribune thus speaks

in relation to this daring forgery :-Two of the morning papers of this city are to-day suspended. It is done in consequence of the publi-cation yesterday in the *Journal of Commerce* and the *World* of the forged proclamation, and, we pre-sume, by order of the Government. We publish elsewhere a letter from the proprietors of the *Journal* of *Commerce*, with an article which was to have

been printed in that paper this morning. It is, we know, a truthful statement of the facts. The forged proclamation was sent to every paper of the Associated Press, except our own, and in such a shape as to lead those who received it to believe it came from the office of the Association. It was sent, designedly no doubt, when it was presumed that it would be seen by none of the editors, but would be taken by the printers and hurried into a part of the morning edition of each paper, the printers having no time to examine it, even if they were disposed to take the responsibility of rejecting what seemed to be an authovized channel. That it did not find its way to this office was probably an accident-the editorial rooms being closed, and the messenger, perhaps, not know ing how to find his way to the printing office—and to this accident it is due that it was not published in

its circulation, though clumsy in its style, as it was bold and wicked. It was intended, no doubt, to affect being obtained, -we feel that these are calumnies the stock market, as well as to nullify the influence of the news of Grant's succe

Both armies are probably nearly as strong in numbers, and as well equipped as they were before the battles commenced. The Philadelphia Age gives in a few lines the exact position of the two armies in Virginia, at the present time. It says :

Gen. Grant has withdrawn his army belind the Ny river, and is now four niles from Spottsylvania. Gen, Butler has been defeated at Fort Darling, and has retreated to the protection of his gunboats at City Point On Tuesday morning last, by means of various adjustments of their lines, and gradual en-croachments upon Gen. Grant, the Confederates in Virginia occupied a line further north than any occupied by them since the contests in the Wilderness. The Po is no longer their line of defence. They have advanced to the Ny. This stream rises near Mine Run, and flows southeast, passing five miles north of Spottsylvania Court House, and falling into the Po six miles south-east of it. The Confederates now present a north-eastern front along the south bank of the Ny. They have brought their western flank forward until it is about four miles north of Spottsylva nia and near Piney Branch Church, which stands on the south bank of the Ny. Their eastern flank is about three miles east of Spottsylvania. The Confederates have very strong earthworks, and hold pos-session of the ground on which last l'hursday's battle results. Longstreet's forces were reported going has swung his western flank back until it is on the Ny, about four miles south of Chancellorsville. His eastern flank is southeast of this and east of Spott-sylvania. Along nearly all the line, the Ny runs between the opposing armies.

> General Lee has issued a general order, dated May 14, 1864, announcing to his army "the series of successes that, by the favor of God, have recently been achieved by our armies." He mentions the defeat of Sigel, Averill, Banks, Steele and Sheridan, and concludes as follows :--

Seventh .- The heroic valor of the army, with the blessing of Almighty God, has thus far checked the principsl army of the enemy, and inflicted upon it heavy losses. The eyes and hearts of your coun-trymen are turned to you with confidence, and their couraged by the success that has been vouchsafed to us, and stimulated by the great interests that depend upon the issue, let every brave man resolve to endure all, and brave all, until, by the assistance of a just and merciful God, the enemy shall be driven back, and peace secured to our country. Con-tinue to emulate the valor of your courades who have failen ; and remember that it depends upon you whether they shall have died in vain. It is in your power, under God, to defeat the last great effort of the enemy, establish the independence of your native land, and earn the lasting love and gratitude of your countrymen, and the admiration of mankind.
