COTTON AND PAUPERISM.

Willmer and Smith's European Times says " The stock of cotton at present held in Liverpool -and, indeed, throughout Earopecompares very unfavorable with the stock at the corresponding period last year. According to a published statement there are now only 428,000 bales against 1,644,000 in hand on the first of June, 1861. The depressing influence of things in the manufacturing districts is seen in the great increase of paupertism and the pressure on the rates. According to a recent return there were, in the beginning of April, in the counties of Lancashire and Cheshire, no less than 104,000 paupers ; by the first week in May the number had increased to 105,000; in the second week of that month to. a pleasant spectacle, but it is hardly likely to dominish for some time. Indeed it is almost certain to increase, notwithetanding all the precautions which many worthy and philantaropic persons are using to arrest it. Parlia-ment has yet two months to sit, and it will be lound necessary, we fear, to make some pro-vision out of the Consolidated Fund to meet the wants of the coming winter. Every day's news serves to show that cotton from the United States is not to be expected during the present year. It becomes clearer also every day that the war cannot be terminated during the present campaign, and we must not close onr eyes to the fact that the long r the struggle continues the greater will become the pressure on the poor rates."

It cannot be doubted that we are approaching a time when a more important question even than that of an offer of Meditation may have to be considered by England and France. # INTERVENTION.

#### From the London Times, June 12th.

It is plain that the time is approaching when Europe will have to think seriously of its re-

lations to the two belligerents in the American war. A contest is raging of which we can predict nothing but that every week will aid to the hatreds of the two communities, and will pread ruin wider and wider. The state of affairs disclosed to us by the last advices deserves anxious consideration. Along an im-mense frontier, from the ocean to the Mississippi, armies amounting at the lowest estimate to nearly a quarter of a million on each side were opposed in military operations which the Federal commanders admit must be slow, toilsome, and uncertain. \* \* \* But it is with the contest as a whole that we are concerned. There must be now, we think, but one opinion about it. The war has become a war of hatred and vengence, in which each combatant has pledged himself to fight to the last, and in which the extermination of one party gives the only hope of peace. One word has been in the hearts of men of reason and feeling for some time past, though the passions of the hour in America have prevented it from rising to their lips. That word is " Mediation. That North and South must now choose be tween separation and ruin, material and political is the opinion of nearly every one who, looking im, artially and from a distance on the con-flict, sees what is hidden from the frenzied eyes of the Northern politicians. Two distin-guished members of the British Government, the Foreign Secretary and the Chancellor of the Econquer-have expressed this opinion in forcible language, and have ther by brought down on themselves a storm of reviling from the American press, and even the American pulpit The temper in which the honest judg-ment of Englishmen has been received in a matter in which they have observed the strictest neutrality, shows that we have been wise to refrain from offering advice, or from hoping that any triendly interference of a kindred people would be received with good will at Washington. But it is possible that another nation will be listened to more calmly than the "Britisher." That France must be con-ciliated is almost as much an axiom of American polities as that England must be slignted can pointes as that England must be slighted and rebuffed. We cannot be mistaken re-specting the desire of the French E aperor to bring the war to an end. 


