A meeting attended by about 6000 people was held at Ashton-under-Lyne to consider the crisis in the Manufacturing Cotton district. A motion calling on the Government to recognise Confederate States, and adopt Cobden's afteration in Maratime Law was prorosed. An amendment was offered calling on governments of England, France and America to crush the rebellion; but on the division the original motion was carried by a consi-

derable majority.

The Times publishes a letter from Mr. Russell explaining the difficulties thrown in nis way by Secretary Stanton when he sought to visit t e British Man-of-War "Rinaido"said difficulties amounting virtually to a pro-hibition. He thinks Secretary Stanton would order away the "Rinaldo" if he dared. Mr. Russell further savs :- " In conclusion I may be permitted to add that I have received assurances that Gen! McClellan has expressed himself strongly in reference to Stanton's conduct to himself and to me in the matter, and that he and all his staff have been kind enough to declare to my friends how deeply they regret my absence from their camp."

PARLIAMENTARY PROCEEDINGS. In the House of Commons on the 1st some, explanations were made as to delay in American Mails landed at Queenstown. The principal difficulty was in catching the steamers from Dublin for Holyhead, and Government stated that arrangements were being made to remove the difficulty.

On the 2nd Sir G. C. Lews said the House would have ample opportunity to discuss the question of defences, as it would be his duty shortly to ask leave to bring in a Bill for another loan for National defences.

Layard stated that the Italian Government had sent over a commissioner to negotiate a treaty of Commerce.

Col. Butler, who had intended to call attention to distress an Cottan manufacturing Districts pastponed the matter for a few

Maguire called attention to distress, and reported deaths from starvation in Ireland, and asked what Government propossed doing. Sir Robert Peel admitted that distress did exist to some extent, but the accounts were greatly exaggerated; Government deeply regretted the distress, but could not atempt to alleviate it by indiscrimate relief.

Layard explained that Military arrangements at Shanghai were purely of a defensive character.

The President explained to what extent the Poor-law guardians could depart from the provisions of the law, and thought the matter should be left in the hands of the Guardians, who were doing their duties very efficiently.

OPENING OF THE GREAT EXHIBITION. Graphic details are published of the open-

ng ceremonies at the Great Exhibition, which passed off with perfect success. The number present was 33,000, all season ticket holders. The Times pronounces the ceremonial emphatically the grandest, best managed, and most imposing public pageant seen in England for years. Matters were, of course, in an unfinished state, in building; but certainly in a more forward state than at the opening in 1851. Compared with 1851 the mere spectacle was as much more gorgeous as the Exhibition itself is better.

Earl Granville in the name of the Commisnoners presented the accress to the Duke of Cambridge as the representative of the Queen; and the Duke made a suitable reply. The death of Prince Albert being feelingly dwelt upon by both. The Duke of Cambridge subsequently, by command of the Queen, proclaimed the Exhibit on formally opened, aminst enthusiastic cheering. The Musical arrangements were carried out according to programme, and were very grand.

The Morning Post in an Editorial on the opening moralizes on and deplores the sad spectacle presented by the American attendance at the Exhibition. The second day's admission at one guinea was 32,596.

MEXICAN AFFAIRS.

The New Slave Trade Treaty.

The new treaty between Great Britain and the United States for the suppression of the Arrican Slave Trade is a very satisfactory evidence of the desire of the Federal Government to lend all the aid in their power towards putting an end to the detestable trade in human flesh-a trade which has been chiefly carried on, of late years, in Northern ships,

and with Northern capital. The treaty allows the cruisers of either party o search the suspected merchant vessels of the other within the distance of wo hundred miles from the coast of Africa, and to the southward of the 22nd parallel of north latitude, and withfles the equipment which shall be taken as evidence of an intention to engage in the slave

trade, namely :-1. Hatches with open gratings instead of the close hatches, which are usual in merchant

2. Divisions or bulkheads in the hold or on deck in greater number than are necessary for ressels engaged in lawful trade. 3. Spare plank fitted for laying down a se-

cond or slave deck. 4. Shackles, bolts or handcuffs.

5. A larger q antity of water in casks or in tanks than is requisite for the consumption of the crew of the vessel as a merchant vessel.

6. An extraordinary number of water casks or of other vessels for nolding liquid, unless he master shall produce a certificate from the Custom House at the place from which he leared outward, stating that a sufficient security had been given by the owners of such vessel that such extra quantity of casks or o' o her vessels should be used only to hold palm oil, or for other purposes of lawful commerce.

7. A greater number of messtubs or kids than requisite for the use of the crew of the vessel as a merchant vessel 8. A boiler or other cooking apparatus of an inusual size, and larger, or capable of being

made larger, than requisite for the use of the crew of the vessel as a merchant vessel, or more than one boiler or other cooking apparatus of the ordinary size.

9. An extraordinary quantity of rice, of he flour of Brazil, of manioc or cassada, commonly called tarina, of maize, or of Indian corn, or of any other article of tood whatever, beyond the probable wants of the crew; unless such rice, faring, flour, maize, Indian corn, or other articles of food, be entered on the manifest as part of the carge for trade.

10. A quantity of mats or matting greater than is necessary for the use of the crew of the vessel as a merchant vessel; unless such mais or matting be entered on the manifest as

part of the cargo for trade. It provides for the establishment at Sierra Leone, Cape of Good Hope, and New York, of mixed Courts formed of an equal number of the individuals of the two nations, which courts shall adjudicate without appear on all prize cases brought before them. Provision is also made for prompt reparation and comensation for any illegal exercise of the right of search conceded. Negroes found on board slavers are to be set at liberty and re nain iree. The officers and crews of slavers are to be punished according to the laws of the country to which the vessel belongs ; and when the expense and inconvenience would not be too great, are to be sent to that coun-


